Proceedings of the Democratic Convention.

The Democracy of Clackamas county met in Convention, by delegates, in this city last Wednesday. The Convention was called to order at 11 o'clock by John Myers, Esq., Chairman of the Democratic County Committee. W. L. White, Esq., was chosen temporary Secretary.

On motion of Capt. Hedges, a committee of five was appointed by the chair on credentials, consisting of Messrs. A. F. Hedges, W. H. Fawcett, C. F. Beattie, W. W. Cooke and J. H. Hamilton.

On motion of H. Straight, a committee of three were appointed on permanent organization, consisting of H. Straight, A. Carmichael and J. L. C. Miller.

On motion of Capt. Hedges, the Convention took a recess to 1 o'clock.
