Hiram R. Revels.

Most people have heard that for the first time in the history of the United States, a colored Senator has been returned to the halls of Washington, and they have consequently wondered who and what manner of man is Senator Hiram R. Revels. Every one does not know that he is a Leavenworth man, and that while here he was a minister of such scandalous proclivities that his own brethren and flock turned upon him and forced tures new. brief space as possible. Mr. Hiram R. Revels was born in the State of North Carolina, and we first hear of him in St. Louis, where he succeeded his brother in the charge of a church, and where he became involved in a desperate church riot, wherein he himself was knocked down by a bottle, and in consequence of which about fifty arrests were made. For this he was dismissed from the church, and took to school teaching for a living.

In 1864 he was again admitted into the church, and came to Leavworth in 1865.

In this city he speedily became. as pastor of the M. E.
