

#### OUR STANDARD DEARERS.

We had only time last week to insert the names of our standard bearers and the platform on which they were placed. We now propose to give our readers a short sketch of the respective candidates. HON. JAMES H. SLATER,

the nominee tor Congress, has been a citi zen of this State since 1852. He resided in Benton county from that time until 1863. On his arrival he commenced teaching a country school near Cervallis, during which time he finished reading law, and was admitted to practice, we believe, in 1853. He was a member of the Legislature of 1857 and also of the first session of the State Legislature of 1859. His abilities and high moral character won for him the esteem and confidence of all parties. Afterwards he engaged in publishing a Democratic paper at Corvallis, which was the leading organ of the party in the State. In 1862 he sold out the paper and moved on a farm near Corvallis, where he remained until 1863, and then he went to Auburn, Baker county, where he engaged in mining and the practice of law. He soon gained a reputation among his fellow-citizens that gave him a position at the bar second to no attorney in the State, and he retired from mining in 1865 and removed to La Grande, Union county, where he engaged in his profession and where he now resides. He was elected prosecuting attorney in the fifth Judicial District in 1866, which office he filled with credit to himself. At the last Presidential election he was one of the electors, and through his energies, as much as any other man, we gained the victory. He was the unanimous choice of the party for his present position, there not being a name placed in opposition to his in the Convention. ### Ratification Meeting in Portland,

The Democracy of Portland had a rous-

ing ratification meeting in that city last

Monday evening. Oro Fino Theater was

crowded long before the time arrived for

the commencement of speaking, and hundreds were forced to go away for want of room to get into the building. The meeting was organized by the election of Hon. J. L. Scoggin, as Chairman. Hon. Jas H. Slater, nominee for Congress was then introduced, who delivered a masterly speech of two hours length. He completely vindicated the Democracy from the charges of the Radicals, and showed conclusively that the platform adopted at Albany contained nothing but justice and equity to all parties-the people as well as the bondholders of the nation. He proved that at least one half of our present great national debt was a fraud on the country, and that the taxpayers are now paying six per cent. interest on this enormous amount of pretended debt that the resolution by Congress to pay the debt in coin which was contracted in currency, was a fraud on the people and an outrage on the consumer, who has to bear the burdens of taxation; that it was the duty of Congress to protect the masses and not enact class legislation for the benefit and exclusive moneyed interests of the country; that the Republicans was the only repudiation party in the Union-they have repudiated their contracts with the nation, with the widows and orphans, and never kept faith in any of their public pledges. The speech was received with applause and was an able effort for the commencement of the great battle of our present struggle. He was followed by Judge L. L. McArthur, of Baker county, nomince for Judge of the Fifth Judicial District. The Judge is an able and pleasing speaker, and reviewed the tyranny and injustice of the Republican party for the past ten years in an effective style. Hon. R. A. Price, of Baker City, was then introduced. He showed by his argument that Congress and the Republican party were guilty of fraud and corruption by attempting to force the people to pay the present debt in any other way than by the terms of the contract; that the present stagnation in all of our industrial enterprises was due to the fact that there is no money to carry on legitimate business avocations; that the bondholder has all the means in his hands, and to him we are continually pouring out our substance; that there were 30,000 people out of employment in Chicago, 25,000 in Boston, 100,000 in New taken. Col. Jas. K. Kelly was the next speaker. The Col. was evidently at home before the large crowd, on taking the floor was received with rounds of applause.
