Ratification Meeting—The Court House Crowded to Overflowing.

Hon. Jas. H. Slater, the Democratic nominee for Congress, addressed the citizens of this place last Tuesday evening. Though the notice given that he was to speak was short, the Court House was not large enough to hold all who desired to hear him. At 7 o'clock, the speaker was introduced to the audience by Col. W. L. White. He spoke for nearly two hours in a masterly style, making every point he touched upon clear to the hearer. Never was there an audience so completely spell-bound as that which listened to him. Every one seemed to be anxious to hear the great issues discussed by the champion of the people—for the Democracy to-day, as they have always, stand between the people and the bondholders and an imperial government. We have not space to go into a minute summary of his speech. He convinced every hearer that at least one-half of the present debt is an extortion from the people, and for which never one cent came into the Treasury of the United States, and that, if an equitable adjustment is had of the debt, the country could at least save one-half of the money which is now collected and reduce the actual indebtedness. He also proved that the present national debt is greater than it was two years ago, notwithstanding the statements of the Radical to the contrary. He showed that the 14th and 15th amendments carried with them the enfranchisement of not only the negroes but all the inferior races; all that will be necessary for Congress to strike out the word "white" from the naturalization laws, which will be done as soon as the 15th amendment is declared a law. He also showed that this government is tending towards imperialism, and read the bill which has been introduced in Congress to enforce the 15th amendment, which will be found in today's issue, taking away the sacred right of the ballot box, and making the President and his appointees the sole judges who should be his successor. Many an honest voter was astonished to hear to what extent his liberties had been taken from him, and realized the fact that there must be something done before it is too late. Let them read this infamous bill. There is but one hope, and that is, that the honest people of Oregon, those who are in favor of handing down to posterity our once great and free government, to turn out of power those who have aided in bringing about this terrible state of affairs. Let us take the lead, and it will not be long before a majority of the honest masses in other States will follow.

The Act to Enforce the 15th Amendment.

Below will be found an Act which has been introduced in the Senate to enforce the 15th amendment. No reader can be so stupid but what he will readily see that it is an act to establish Grant in the Presidential chair for all time to come, and to perpetuate the rule of the bonded aristocracy. Read it, and then pass it to your honest Republican neighbor, and if he is not ready to surrender his independence as a citizen of a Republic, he will vote against keeping the Radicals longer in power: "An Act to enforce the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution." Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled: Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Interior to appoint, or cause to be appointed, three Commissioners for each election district of the several Congressional districts of the United States to enforce the provisions of the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution. The said Commissioners for each purpose shall have the sole right to decide on the qualifications of all voters who shall offer to vote for members of Congress or electors for President or Vice President, and the exclusive authority to receive the ballots cast at any such election. Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of such Commissioners to certify the result of the election in their districts respectively, duly sealed, to the said Secretary of the Interior. Sec. 3. The Secretary of the Interior shall certify under his hand and seal the names of the persons who appear to him by the aforesaid returns to be elected members of Congress or electors for President and Vice President, and the persons who shall receive such certificate of election shall hold the office or exercise the authority therein designated, subject to the sixth section of this act. Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the United States Marshals in their respective districts to assist the Commissioners of election herein provided for, in the performance of their duties, and shall detail a sufficient force of deputies to secure order at the election herein provided for; and in the event of the force of any such Marshal proving inadequate, the Marshal shall have the right to call on the nearest commanding officer of troops of the United States to aid such Marshal to preserve order. Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of War to station the troops of the United States immediately preceding any election herein provided for, at convenient points adjacent to the principal polling places of the several Congressional districts, and in the principal cities commanding force of such troops shall be emplaced in the parks or other suitable places of such cities, at and preceding any election as aforesaid. Sec. 6. All questions in regard to the regularity and fairness of the election of members of Congress shall be referred by the Secretary of the Interior to the House of Representatives, who shall have exclusive jurisdiction thereof, and in like manner all questions relative to the election of electors for President and Vice President shall be referred to the President. He shall appoint a committee of not less than three suitable persons to examine into and decide upon such questions, and whose decision shall be final and conclusive. Sec. 7. This act shall go into effect when Congress shall, by resolution, declare that three-fourths of the States have ratified the proposed Fifteenth Amendment, and have decreed that the Constitution is amended accordingly.
