TOWN AND COUNTY.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.—AUGUST TERM.—The following are the County Court proceedings for Clackamas County, at the August term, Judge W. K. Wait presiding:

The County Clerk was ordered to make a requisition for two copies of the Code of Laws for Clackamas County, and for Cutting's precedent.

Application of J. H. Hamilton for a license to sell liquor was refused. Petition of J. R. W. Sellwood to have road leading from Caban's store, thence to the O. C. R., thence easterly to intersect the Foster and Milwaukie roads, was granted. Messrs. J. L. Casen, Hiram A. Straight and J. L. Hunsacker were appointed viewers.

The petition of citizens to have a road located commencing at Howard's mill and thence to May's mill, on Mill creek, thence to Baker Prairie, was granted and S. Waldron, Adam Kohnst and Jos. Parrott were appointed viewers.

The petition which had been circulated by the Court for instructions whether the people desired to have a number of bridges built, was returned. A majority remonstrated.

The report of the viewers for a private road for Chas. Stoker, was placed on file and read the first time.

The Clerk was ordered to receive bids for the building of a bridge across Abernethy creek.

The claim of David Wright for damages on account of a defective bridge, was allowed \$25.

Mr. Warner was ordered to have the jail repaired. The following bills were ordered paid: Expense for advertising, \$47; A. West, \$17; for jurors at July term, \$13; J. M. Frazer, as per bill rendered, \$85.00; State vs. G. Wilson, \$20; D. Wright, \$24; Campbell & Capps, \$12; J. M. Bacon, for stationery, \$4.88; A. Warner, as per bill rendered, \$37; White for board of Roads, \$6.50.

ADMINISTRATOR.—The estate of John Loring allowed further time and ordered to report at the September term.

ADMINISTRATOR.—The estate of F. Charman, requested further time to file his annual report; allowed.

The guardian of H. Neans, insane, filed an inventory. Appraisers are appointed and instructed to report at the next term. In the matter of the estate of Foster, will admitted to probate and ordered recorded with proofs.
