PARIS, Aug. 15.—The Herald's cable correspondent gives a letter from Gen. Beckler, in command of the Zouaves of Metz, dated the 14th inst. He writes that the Prussians were making an effort to reach Paris by getting between the French forces stationed at Chalons and Metz.
