

**The Prussian Military Organization.**

The Prussian system of military organization is unlike that of this country, and a slight sketch of it may therefore be useful in enabling our readers to comprehend the importance of the conflicts in the present war, and the number of troops engaged. The Prussian army is organized in companies, battalions, regiments, and corps d'armee. A battalion, in active service, consists of four companies of 250 men each, or 1,000 in all. A regiment comprises four battalions; a brigade, two regiments; a division, two brigades. To each division are attached four squadrons of cavalry, five batteries of artillery, of six guns each, and a battery of riflemen or pioneers. The Corps d'armee is regarded as a unit, dependent upon itself and comprising within itself all the materials for sustaining a campaign individually. It consists of two divisions of infantry, a cavalry division, of four regiments, with two batteries of horse artillery attached, besides the two cavalry regiments attached to each infantry division, and a reserve of artillery consisting of five field and two mounted batteries. It will thus be seen that a battalion contains 1,000 men; a regiment, 4,000; a brigade 8,000; a division, 10,000; and a Corps d'armee, 32,000 infantry, 12,000 cavalry, besides artillery, field and mounted, amounting altogether to about 50,000 men. Now if we apply these statistics to General Steinmetz's report of the recent conflict between Saarbruck and Forbach, we shall be able to arrive at a fair idea of the number of troops engaged on the Prussian side. The battle was opened by Fourteenth Division, consisting of 16,000 men, who were reinforced by six battalions, three batteries, and some cavalry, showing that about 25,000 men stormed the heights of Spiechgen. Another division, the Thirteenth, advanced simultaneously on Verklingen, captured Forbach, and finally occupied Forbach. It thus appears that no less than 40,000 troops were engaged in the battle on the side of the Prussians, and taking artillery and cavalry into account, the number would probably be raised to 45,000 the whole of the troops constituting the First Army Corps. It seems probable that at least 100,000 combatants were engaged on both sides, in this battle, and that already from 200,000 to 300,000 men have been brought into action in the campaign. When it is remembered that all this fighting is but preliminary to the great battle which is now imminent, some idea may be formed of the magnitude of the struggle, and the extent of the forces engaged in it on either side.—Record.
