THE NEXT APPOINTMENT.—The House of Representatives now has 244 members. By the new law, Congress, under the next apportionment, is to have 244 members. The census returns indicate that the population is about 38,000,000, an increase of 7,000,000 since 1860. This will give about 163,258 population to each member. The New England States will each lose one Member, Massachusetts losing two. New York will lose four, Pennsylvania and Ohio three each. Of the Southern States, Virginia, South Carolina, Louisiana and Kentucky will lose one each, and Texas will gain one. Of the Western States, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and Kansas gain one each, and Illinois and Missouri two. New Jersey, it is thought, may gain one, and is the only State on the Atlantic coast which will gain. Of the whole country, New England loses seven, the Middle States nine, and the Southern States three, while the West gains nine—the Pacific States remaining as heretofore.
