TOWN AND COUNTY.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY AND OREGON CITY.—We find the following notices of Clackamas county and Oregon City in the Pacific Coast Business Directory. They are rather fair and complimentary, yet fully justified:

CLACKAMAS COUNTY.—Bounded north by Multnomah, east by Wasco, south by Marion, and west by Marion, Yamhill, and Washington. Area, 1,600 square miles. Assessed valuation of property for 1899, \$1,700,000. County seat, Oregon City. Principal towns, Milwaukie and Oswego. The county comprises a most important section of the Cascade range on the east, and includes the Willamette river within its limits, which runs from south to north, near its western border. The eastern portion is mountainous, its northeast corner being laid beneath the lofty and symmetrical Mount Hood, the most important and conspicuous territorial monument any political division can boast. The valleys of the Willamette and other streams are exceedingly fertile, and produce of excellent quality. The peculiar feature of the county is the great water power afforded by the falls of Willamette at Oregon City, where this large stream precipitates itself over a ledge of rocks in a perpendicular fall of fifty feet, affording for the use of man a force calculated at one million horsepower. The river being navigable above and below, the broad valley exceedingly fertile, forest of the great evergreen abounding, and extensive beds of the richest iron ore known, all combine to give a value to the manufacturing capacity furnished by the falls impossible to estimate. The Oregon Central and East Portland Railroad, being the northern portion of the California and Oregon Railroad, is already completed through the county, which affords additional means of communication with Portland, the commercial center of the State.

Oregon City, Clackamas Co., P. O., is incorporated and county seat, is on the bank of the Willamette, thirty-eight miles north of Salem, and thirteen miles south of Portland. Here the hills upon each side approach the river, creating the water over a ledge of rocks of from twenty to thirty feet in height, furnishing a power for manufacturing purposes of unlimited capacity. In this canyon is Oregon City, commanding the great water power, and probably engaged in the transportation of goods for the western coast. The city is the oldest incorporated town in the State. Its great manufacturing advantages being observed and appreciated by the early settlers, who selected it for their headquarters, and who have since by the falls is already well applied, extensive flour saw and woolen mills being operated by it. The Oregon City Woolen Mill has gained a wide celebrity from the excellence of its manufacture. The annual consumption of wool amounts to 500,000 pounds, and it sends its goods to every market on the Pacific coast. A flourishing graded school is in operation, and the schools and religious institutions are maintained. The Enterprise is published weekly.

MISSISSIPPI CONVENTION.—The Missionary Convention of the Episcopal Church commenced in this city last evening, and will continue until after Sunday. Services will be held in the morning and evening of each day, and on Sunday afternoon, instead of the regular Sunday School, there will be an especial service for children and parents, with short missionary addresses. The public are respectfully requested to attend these services. Among the clergy present are Rt. Rev. Bishop Morris, Rev. Mr. Story, of Portland, Rev. Mr. Nicholson, of Vancouver, Rev.
