

A Radical View of South Carolina.

The special correspondent of the New York Tribune, writing from Columbia, S. C., says of the political situation in that State as follows:

In a total of 729,000 inhabitants, there are about 425,000 negroes, who, as a class are ignorant, superstitious, semi-barbarous, but little elevated in intelligence above their kindred in Africa. I speak of the great mass of the negroes, of the plantation "field hands." They are extremely indolent, and will make no exertion beyond what is necessary to obtain food enough to satisfy their hunger. They rarely commit great crimes, but are given to petty thieving to a great extent. Toward the white men they are still deferential, and assume an air of abject submission; but they are distrustful to the white men, by whom they know they are hated. Upon these people not only political rights have been centered, but they have absolute politicals now, money. They are the governing class in South Carolina, and a class more totally unfit to govern does not exist upon the face of the earth. There are not a dozen highly educated negroes in the whole State, and the whole number that can read and write is comparatively small.

Let the reader bear in mind that the above comes from the highest Radical authority in the land, and then remember that the state of affairs here described is now being sustained and perpetuated by the whole power of the administration. This a specimen of our restored Union! God save the mark!

What Slave Republicans Can Do.

The Interior (Presbyterian) is somewhat puzzled to understand the necessity for the force Bill. It says:

We confess that with our arms length view of the matter, we are at a loss to understand the meaning of this kind of legislation, except on two suppositions. One of these is, that the Ku Klux organization is a far more serious thing than the Administration itself has allowed the people to believe. The other is, that the passage of the bill is a part of the strategy for the approaching campaign. It is, to say the least, a little remarkable that all the States but two, in which the outrages are anticipated, are in the hands of Republicans, who, having failed to suppress disorder by Slave authority, might ask the intercession of the General Government.

The last clause of the above is a sufficient answer to the first proposition, and shows also that the passage of the outrageous measure was to enable Grant not only to secure his re-nomination, but also to make his election sure. The alleged Ku Klux outrages were simply pretenses to put into the hands of a party President to secure, beyond fail, his own re-election.

All the States but two, as the Interior says, are in the hands of Republicans. How many of them have notified the President that they are unable to suppress disorder by State authority? The whole thing is a mere pretext, as we have said, to enable Grant to re-elect himself. He is empowered to suspend the writ of liberty, to declare martial law, to try citizens by military courts, to imprison and put to death. He is clothed with absolute power, and can proclaim himself Dictator; and all to continue himself in office. And that has been done by the party calling itself Republican! — *Waukesha Philander.*
