## TOWN AND COUNTY.

**THE FOURTH IN OREGON CITY.**—The Fourth of July was most gloriously celebrated in this city last Tuesday, and every thing passed off to the entire satisfaction of all who participated. At 10 o'clock the procession was formed at the corner of Main and Eighth streets, in the following order: Grand Marshal, W. P. Burns, Esq.; with Messrs. S. D. Pope, and A. F. Forbes as aids; national colors, Brass Band, Officers of the Day, Mayor and City Council, Chief Engineer, and Captain of the Fire Department; Company No. 1, Columbia Hook & Ladder Company No. 2, Columbia Hook & Ladder Company No. 1, Liberty Carr containing thirty-seven beautiful little girls with banners representing the different States of the Union, drawn by four grey horses, which was the great feature of the procession. We doubt whether an equal number of as beauty young misses can be found in any town in the West where the **Fourth** is celebrated.

The **Day** was tramped to A. White and it was most artistically done for which he deserves credit. The Fire Companies presented a very good appearance, with their handsomely decorated carts and trucks. The Hook & Ladder Company was dressed in their new uniforms, and looked well enough to reflect credit on any nation. The procession then marched up Main street to the corner of First and then counter-marched to the arbor by the Catholic church which had been erected for the occasion, and a better and more convenient place could not have been found in the State. The brass band did well, it is comfortable and cool, and long after the exercises were ended the people sought the arbor for a cool retreat. The following order of exercises were had when the procession reached the arbor: Music by the Oregon City Brass Band; Introduction of the President of the Day, Col. W. L. White; Singing by the Glee Club; Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. J. R. W. Sellwood, of Milwaukee, was very appropriate; the singing under the leadership of Rev. J. R. Sellwood, was most excellent, and showed that we have good musical talent in our city. Chas. E. Warren, Esq., read the Declaration in a clear and distinct manner. The oration, Dr. J. F. Caples, of Portland, was a rich treat to our citizens. He spoke for near an hour, reviewing the history of the world in a concise and distinct manner, and brought himself down to our own country's history in such a comprehensive style and eloquent language that he infused the spirit of our patriotic ancestors in the hearts of our young minds.

His oration was highly historical, and destined of anything which could have given offence to any one present. He was frequently interrupted with applause, and at the close of the oration, the President of the Day proposed three cheers for the Orator of the Day, which was responded to in a hearty and spirited style by the large audience.

It was the best oration we have ever heard, and we trust it will give the author a foremost rank in this State. We heard a number of citizens declare it to be the best oration that they had ever listened to.

The **Day** was a success, and the exercises were ended with a general shout.

At the close of the celebration, the President of the Day proposed three cheers for our old friend Gus, Schwartau, of Salem. He has somewhat increased in proportions and looks as though his study in Idaho was beneficial to his growth.
