The other Protestant Churches of the city had no service, and their people took part with and filled the house of their Baptist brethren. This house is 54x32 feet, the basement being ten feet in height, and the main andience room being 21 feet in height in the center of the ceiling. at the opening of the extremes was the presentation of an elegant Bible by Rev. Mr. Gerry, Congregational minister, in behalf of his Church, with a neat and fraternal address. This was responded to by ternal address. This was responded to by Dr. Chandler in behalf of the Baptist Church. Rev. Mr. Hines of the M. E. Church, took part in prayer. The dedication sermon was preached by Rev. Ezra Fisher, a man of venerable years and appearance, who came to Oregon as a missinary in 1845, and was paster of the church here about 1853-4. He seemed much affected in viewing this new advance of the people he had formerly ministered to. His sermon was followed by a short historic statement written and read by Hon. W. C. Johnson, from which it appears that the church was organized in 1847 with seven members; that 44 had been received by immersion, two of whom are now successful preachers of the gospel; that over 50 others had a home in the church from time to time; that by death, dismission by letter, and exclusions the number of members was now made 34, 22 of whom live in this vicinity. He closed with a financial statement showing a debt of about \$2,000 on their present property. Then commenced the astonishing part of the day's doings. Rev Mr. Curtis, Gen. Missionary of the Am. Bapt, Home Miss. Society for this State, came this sum before leaving the house, and after a brief exhortation, called for pledges. In less than three-quariers of an hour \$2,057, was raised in pledges and payments, the first ranging all the way from \$2 up to \$300 each. This will wipe out the church debt, but something over \$300 is needed to purchase an organ


