the front. Kentucky had the greatest number of exemption claims, 52 per cent of all men called filling affidavits. The average number of claims was 46 per cent. This amount had been refunded to the states by the federal government. It represents an average cost of \$4.93 per man accepted for military service, and with the provost marshal general's expenses included, \$5 per man, against a cost of \$24.48 per voluntary recruit in 1914; \$19.54 in 1915, and \$28.95 in the first nine months of 1917. Prior to the draft act during the Civil war, the cost per man was about \$34, and after the draft was enforced, about \$9.84. In discussing the future of the draft, General Crowder says the first duty is to provide an adequate army. Economic considerations must be regarded in selecting the men, he says, but not at the expense of an efficient fighting force. Viewed beside the efforts Germany and Austria have put forth to place man power in the field, he adds, it little becomes us to emphasize above a
