**Turns Somersault to Show Company He Is Not Tired**

TOKIO, Jan. 1.—W. H. Hardy, an 82 year old American sailor, the sole survivor of Commodore Perry's expedition to Japan in 1853, who now is revisiting Japan, recently surprised Japanese nobility at a dinner, by turning a summersault to allay their concern for his weariness. He continues to be lionized by all classes, high and low. His years rest on him lightly, and thus far he has been able to keep up a steady succession of lectures, interviews and sermons, in which he joins the reminiscences of his visit with Perry's fleet to a simple earnest plea for a warm friendship today between America and Japan. Reverence for old age is almost instinctive in the east and Mr. Hardy meets with a warm welcome and a sympathetic hearing everywhere. He styles himself "the Grandfather of Japan."
