### der the total a year ago. MAKE KRAUT FOR HOME USE.

The Country Gentleman gives the following directions for making and keeping sauer kraut:

Cabbages which show signs of spoiling in storage should be made into kraut for use in late winter or spring. Little equipment is needed, and the methods of preserving cabbage in this way may be practiced in any home.

Remove the loose outer leaves from the heads of cabbage and split them in halves. Remove the core and the woody core lining from each half with a sharp knife. Slice the cabbage into long, fine shreds. While this operation may be done with a sharp knife a hand kraut cutter, costing from \$1.25 to \$2, will be found good investment on the average

Although kraut for market or commercial purposes usually is packed in wooden casks or concrete tanks, it is cured and kept most satisfactorily for home use in earthenware jars. A five or ten gallon jar is a convenient size for the average fam-

After the jar is thoroughly cleaned and scalded, place in a layer of shredded cabbage, four or five inches in depth. As soon as gas bubbles cease to rise the kraut has finished curing. Several days later it is ready for use. Its color at that time should be

Kraut may be used from the jar from time to time if the remaining liquor covers the contents of the jar after each lot is removed. The jar should be kept in a cool place after

the curing process has ceased. If desired for summer use, remo the kraut from the jar, squeeze out the liquor, scald the jar, but the kraut back into the jar and pack firmly, and cover with a newly-made brine-one-fourth of a pint of sait dissolved in two gallons of water.
