CHICAGO, Jan. 10 .- Peace devel opments had a bearish effect today on grain. Corn closed unsettled 1-8 to 1/2 @5-8c net lower at \$1.27 1/4 January and \$1.24 7-8@1.25 for May. Oats lost 3-4 to 1 14c. In provisions the result was an advance of 20 to 35c.

A wave of selling due to peace talk brought about sharp breaks in the value of oats. Previously, the market had bulged on account of good sized export sales. Provisions advanced briskly be-

cause of the various moves which

were taken as indicating a growing

liklihood of peace. At first though, increased arrivals of hogs temporar ily weakened the market. STOCKS STRONG

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 .- Prices on the stock exchange today advanced and receded within a restricted area until the final hour when buying of steels, shippings and a few active

specialties effected numerous net gains of one to three points. Overnight developments and incidents of the day seemed to exert little influence, apart from the December report of the United States Steel corporation. This showed an increase of almost 500,000 tons in unfilled orders and marked the first gain since last April, when the high record of

tonnage was established. A very large percentage of the day's turnover was contributed by steels and affiliated industrials, shippings, oils and war specialties. Rails were unusually apathetic, some of the more prominent issues of that division remaining unquoted until the last hour.

United States Steel scored an extreme advance of two and a half points from its minimum closing at a net gain of a substantial fraction. Independent steels and kindred equipments were more variable, ending at losses of large fractions to a point.

Advices affecting the general steel and iron industry were hardly encouraging, a number of plants being forced to suspend because of the lack of fuel. The strength of steamship issues,

oils and some of the motors and accessories resulted from a combination of professional activity and rumore of increased dividends. Total sales amounted to 535,000 shares. # \$100,000,000 IS PAYROLL OF

Monthly Disbursement to Fighting Forces of United States Given

MANY RANKS INCLUDED

Pay System Is Complicated; Insurance Allotments Not Included

United States is now nearly \$100,-000,000 a month. This sum includes the salaries of officers and enlisted men in the army No. 228 Local and navy serving both in this country and abroad, family allotments and compensation for certain services rendered, but does not take into account family allowances paid by the government toward the support of families of enlisted men, under spe-

cific conditions, nor does it include

any of the special compensatory fea-

tures of the military and naval insurance act. Details of the pay received by the soldiers and sailors and those of the 161 Leaves, operation of the war risk insurance 165 Leaves bureau have just been compiled by the several departments for information of the public and those relating to the navy were made public tonight by the committee on public information. The others will be made

public later and separately. The committee's statement shows that in December aproximately \$17,-000,000 was disbursed as monthly compensation for the services of some 300,000 officers and men who constitute the uniformed force of the navy. This did not include any amounts that might have been paid under the war risk act as family allowances or other compensations pro-

The system of pay in the navy is

vided for by that law.

complicated by a large number of ranks and ratings as well as financial rewards for special merit and service and allowances made for quarters for officers serving on shore duants and apprentice seamen, to the \$833 a month paid to an admiral commanding a fleet. Added to the officers' regular pay is graduated compensation for length of the part of ty. The salaries range from the compensation for length of service and ten per cent aditional for duty beyond the continental limits of the

United States. Enlisted men are paid sums for first re-enlistment and \$3.30 for each subsequent re-enlistment, if they are citizen of the United States and they completed the previous enlistment. Seamen, gunners get \$2.20 extra a month; stewards or cooks who hold certificates of qualification and are

citizens of the United States get \$5.50 a month extra and enlisted men received eighty-three cents a month ex-for each good conduct medal held.

Men performing specified duties on shipboard receive extra compen-sation ranging from 33 cents a month

!Officers who are retired receive three-fourths of their regular pay. Enlisted men are retired after thirty years service and are paid threefourths of the total pay and allow-ances they received at the date of retirement and cash in lieu of quarters.

and subsistence. Officers and men of the naval re-serve force and the national naval volunteers while on active duty receive the same pay and allowances as those of the same rank and length of service in the regular navy. When first called into active service in time of war or national emergency, a uniform gratuity of \$150 is allowed each officer of the naval reserve, and \$60 to each enlisted man.
