round trips to show the advantage of motor truck transportation over railroad shipments for short hauls. The truck succeeded in achieving the remarkable high figure of more than fourteen miles per gallon of gasoline throughout the test.

For the speed of shipments, the truck also made an excellent showing—making deliveries in fifty hours and fifteen minutes for the three round trips. A total of 19,230 pounds were carried by the truck. On all trips the truck traveled at the rate of about 15 1/2 miles an hour.

Deliveries were made direct to the warehouse, eliminating the extra handling and drayage charges which would have been necessary had the goods been shipped by rail. Shippers consider 200 miles or less a short haul.
