#### **New Canning Machine Is** Installed by Company

The Salem-Kings' Products company plant is still running on carrots, with an occasional spurt on potatoes and turnips to keep up the balance with other vegetables in the celebrated soup stock product. A new canning machine is being

installed which, when in action, will fill and weigh, automatically, the different products put up by this concern in paraffine cartons instead of tin cans.

The process is an interesting one as applied to evaporated foods, and will increase the daily output of packages to an enormous extent. At present women and girls fill the packages and weigh on a set of scales on the work table.


