NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS Sealed proposals, addressed to the Oregon State Board of Control, Salem, Oregon, and endorsed "Proposal for Champeog Pioneer Memorial Building," at State Grounds Champeog, Oregon, will be received by the Oregon State Board of Control at its office in the Capitol Building, Salem, Oregon, until 3:00 p. m. January 21st, 1918, and not thereafter, and at this time and place will be publicly opened and read.

All proposals must be upon blank form to be obtained from George M. Post, Architect, at his office, Room 3, Gray Block, Salem, Oregon; must include the price proposed, both in writing and figures; and must be signed by the bidder, with his address. Plans and specifications are on file with the Board of Control and aforesaid Architect's Office, and may be there seen, and copies may be obtained at the office of the Architect at the above address. All plans and specifications must be returned and accompany each bid.

Each bid is to be presented under sealed cover, and shall be accompanied by a certified check made payable to the Oregon State Board of Control, in the amount of ten per cent (10%) of the amount of said bid, and no bid shall be considered unless certified check is enclosed therewith. 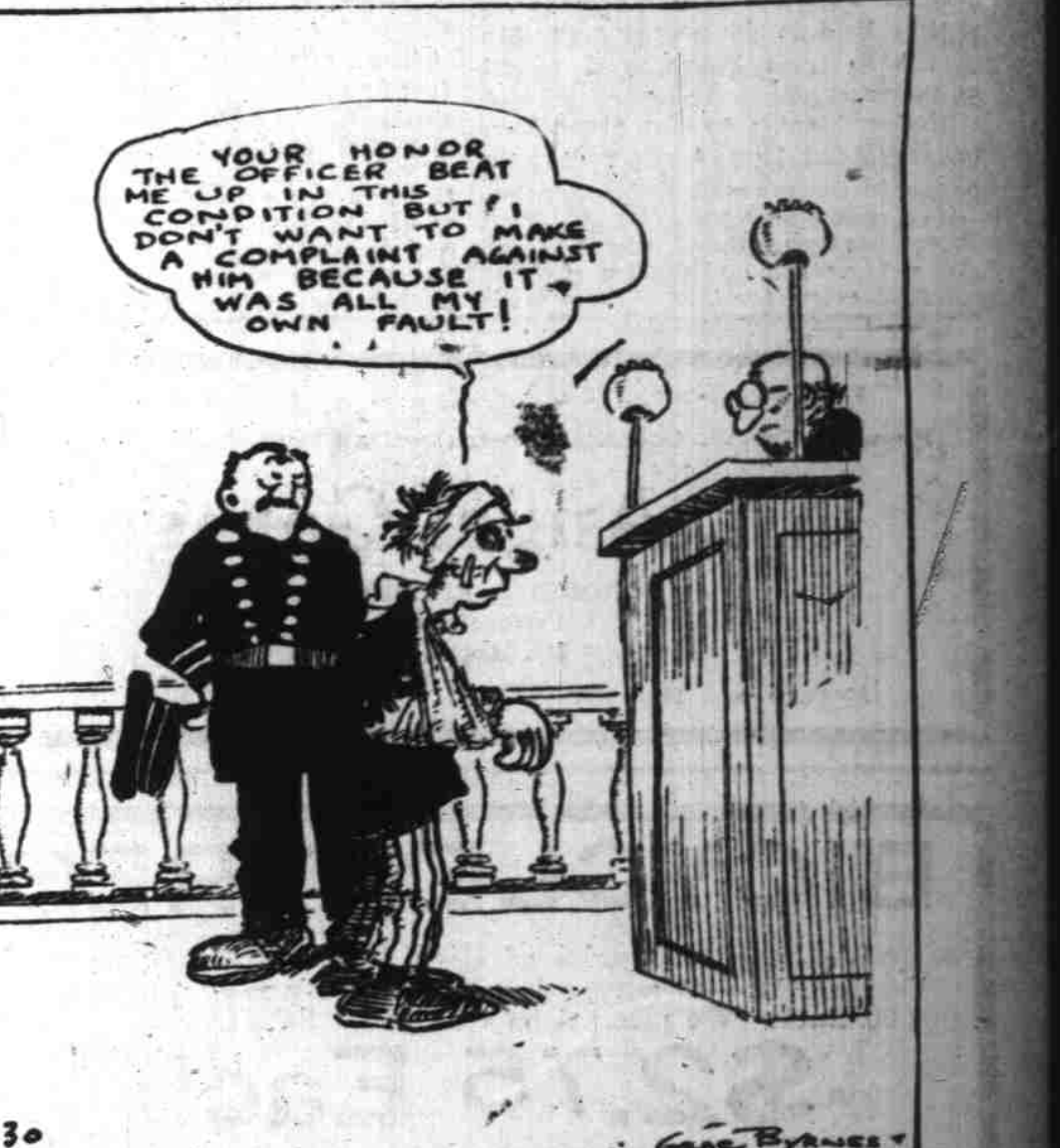

THINGS THAT NEVER HAPPEN



Corn Market Closes Heavy; Railroads Clear Blockade

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—Clearing up of the railroad blockade tended today to ease the corn market. Prices closed heavy, January \$1.27 1/2 and May \$1.24 1-5 with the finish as a whole unchanged to 1/2 cent down compared with 24 hours before. Oats declined 3/4 to 1 cent net. In provisions the outcome varied from a setback of 10 to 35 cents advance.

Faced by prospects of liberal receipts here Monday and Tuesday, the corn market showed a downward slant almost uniformly throughout the session. Oats sagged with corn. Hope of sales to the seaboard led to a temporary bulge which was more than counteracted when no business developed.

Heavier receipts of hog weakened provisions but sharp reduction of the weekly total of hog packing led afterward to rallies. The late upturn partly due to the fact that shipments for the week were shown to have been greatly curtailed by traffic difficulties.

NOTICE OF GERMAN REGISTRATION All German aliens are required to register between February 4th and February 9th 1918.

By proclamation of the President of the United States, all German citizens, citizens, denizens or subjects of the German Empire, or imperial German Government, being males of the age of fourteen years and upwards on registration day who are within the United States and not actually naturalized American citizens are required to register as alien enemies.

The dates of registration within the State of Oregon, have been fixed by the Attorney General of the United States to commence at 8:00 a. m. on February 4th and to continue on each day successively thereafter between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 8:00 p. m. up to and including the 9th day of February, 1918, at 8:00 p. m.

All German aliens residing in, or being within the city of Salem or vicinity are hereby required to present themselves for registration at the Police Station, and to complete their registration on or before the 9th day of February, 1918, at 8:00 p. m.

Any German alien who fails to register within the time fixed therefor, or who fails to comply with the regulations of whom there is reasonable ground to believe that he is about to violate any regulations duly promulgated by the President of the United States, or these regulations, in addition to all other penalties prescribed by law, shall be liable to restraint imprisonment and detention for the duration of the war of the United States, and necessary removal from the United States in the manner prescribed by law.

OBITUARY SCOTTS MILLS, Or., Jan. 19.—Averitt Case Reed was born in West Grandby, Conn., August 3, 1845, moving to Ridgeville, Ohio, with his parents at the age of 7 years. He lived there until June 18, 1861, when he enlisted in the Seventh Ohio Volunteer Infantry. Serving faithfully until the end of the war, he was placed from a bursting shell cut into his shoulder severing his collar bone, cutting off two ribs and lodging in the left lung.

Helpless on the field of battle a Confederate surgeon caring for boys in gray noticed the wounded boy in blue. With a word of sympathy he sprinkled an opiate upon the gaping wound, also placing a dose of morphine upon his tongue. Union stretcher bearers coming later left him for dead, while they bore away those they thought might be saved.

A faithful comrade hunted for him and finding life still in the mutilated body, hunted for surgeons to dress the wound. Miraculously, his life was spared and an honorable discharge was given for physical disability.

With returning health, came the desire to serve his country again and in January, 1864, "Yank," as the boys in blue knew him, re-enlisted in the Ninth Ohio battery, serving until the end of the war. On September 29, 1869, he was united in marriage to Caroline L. Hickox at Grand Rapids, Mich. She survives him.

To this union two children were born, Pearl A. Reed of Hood River, and Mrs. C. A. Dunagan of this place. Also left to mourn him are a niece, Mrs. Willard Moore of Salem, a daughter of L. L. Hickox of Byron Center, Mich., whom they raised from infancy, and a nephew, E. F. Hickox of Portland, caring for him since he was 3 years of age. The latter's father, W. C. Hickox, also shared their home for many years.

In 1892 the family moved to Oregon, residing at Scotts Mills for the past seven years. Mr. Reed was called from a long and useful life January 13, 1918, at the age of 72 years, 5 months and 10 days.
