

ability. With returning health, came the desire to serve his country again and in January, 1864, "Yank," as the boys in blue knew him, re-enlisted in the Ninth Ohio battery. serving until the end of the war.

September 29, 1869, he was united in marriage to Caroline L. Hickox at Grand Rapids, Mich. She survives him.
