FAREWELL SAID TO DR. DONEY

Willamette President Leaves for Observations on Battle Fronts

When the 4 o'clock Oregon Electric left Salem yesterday it carried Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette university, on the first part of his long journey to Europe via New York.

The university drill corps with Captain Artie Walker leading escorted Dr. Doney to the train. Students were there in a body to give their president a farewell. Yells and college songs entertained the busy crowd that gathers on the corner of State and High at that time of day.

In the morning the students took over the chapel hour and the time was devoted to a special program in Dr. Doney's honor. A wrist watch was presented by Harry Bowers, president of the student body, as a fitting climax to his appreciative speech. The four classes were represented by Harold Eakin, Harold Nichols, Lyle Bartholomew and Loraine Basler respectively.

Dr. Doney made an earnest and spoke feelingly of the spirit of cooperation and friendship that exists between the president and students at Willamette. Dr. Steeves' president of the board of trustees, also spoke.

Music had a large place on the program. Solos were sung by Miss Lela Belle, McCaddam, Miss Louise Benson and Archie Smith. The new Willamette quartet composed of Gustav Anderson, Floyd McIntyre, Paul Sterling and Harry Bowers rose to the occasion with two numbers. The glee club sang two numbers and received gratifying applause and high praise from Dr. Doney.

Dr. Doney's departure for New York from where he will sail in a short time after his arrival is in line with the recent action of the trustees granting him a six-months' leave of absence to visit the battlefront as a Y. M. C. A. worker. The trustees felt that in doing this he would honor the university and promote the American cause in this community because when Dr. Doney has returned after his experience in Europe and begins to tell the people here about it they should feel the war as never before.

Dr. George H. Alden the present dean, will have charge of the university in the president's absence.

Ex-Pastor Indicted on Charge of Burning House

PENDELTON, Or., Jan. 22.—The grand jury today returned a true bill against Rev. J. L. Allen, formerly pastor of the Heights Baptist church, held on charge of burning an apartment house at Cascade locks, Or., on hanksiding day. Fire Marshal Stokes was the complaining witness. Rev. Mr. Allen's bail was fixed at \$1500.

Camp Lewis Takes Out \$204,000,000 Insurance

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Camp Lewis at American Lake, Wash., is the first camp to apply for more than \$200,000,000 of the government voluntary insurance for soldiers. Applications from soldiers here up to today totaled \$204,000,000, representing 22,058 policies averaging \$9267 each.

TWO SOLDIERS DIE IN FRANCE

Lieutenant and Private Killed in Collision at Aviation School

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—First Lieutenants William H. Cheney and Oliver P. Sherwood and Private George A. Beach were killed Sunday in a collision of airplanes over an American aviation school in France, the war department was advised tonight by General Pershing.

Lieutenant Cheney's mother, Mrs. William H. Schofield, lives at Peterboro, N. H.; Lieutenant Sherwood's emergency address is Mrs. Lydia C. Sherwood, 354 Carlton avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., and that of Private Beach, Thomas Beach, Fort Collins, Colo.

No details of the accident were given in General Pershing's message.

Business Men Want Tracks to Make Physical Junction

Salem business men, particularly the shippers, expect to take up with the public service commission the question of securing a physical connection between the Southern Pacific and the Oregon Electric tracks in Salem and a fixing of switching charges for the benefit of local traffic. The commission was requested to give the Salem men a hearing yesterday afternoon and waited for them until 5 o'clock, but they did not put in an appearance. It is probable that the visitation to the commission will be made today.
