Government Sanctions Hard-Surfacing of pacific Highway North

State Highway Engineer Nunn announced yesterday that the gove n ment has approved the plans for the hard-surfacing of the Pacific highway from Salem for a distance of twenty-one miles north, Because the road is a postroad the government is to pay half the cost of construction work, the state paying the other half.

Hard surfacing of the road is to begin as soon as weather will permit, and will be done probably with one of the state's new paying plants. This plant is now in Portland, but when the work begins, if done by the states, the plant will be moved to Brooks where it will remain while the first ten miles of the work is under way. 
