vance of five cents. Unfavorable weather for the crop movement from the country made corn prices harden a little at the outset, but the fact speedily became apparent that the adverse conditions prevailing had materially diminished. A further reason given for the evident cautiousness of buyers was the prospect of enlarged government

control of grain prices other than Urgent export demand for shipment by the way of the gulf did much to hoist the value of oats, and so, too, did the meagerness of arrivals. New high price records for the season were reached for all deliveries, with the market showing its greatest
