CHAPTER TO SET AMOUNTS ASIDE

Most Soldiers' Dependents in Salem Hope to Pay Back Help Fund

Willamette chapter, American Red Cross, will be asked by the civilian relief committee of the chapter to set aside \$100 a month for care of local dependent families of soldiers or sailors.

This action was decided upon at a meeting of the committee yesterday. It is not believed that the whole amount will be needed and any residue will revert to the chapter.

The committee is already helping a number of dependent families and Manager McDaniel of the commercial club has a list of all others that are likely to need assistance.

Many of these need assistance only until the first installments of their soldiers' pay allowances are received.

The main reason for asking that a certain sum be set aside by the chapter for the use of the committee is to spare dependents the embarrassment of going before the chapter board.

The chapter has procured the services of a woman recently from Seattle who represents the committee in visiting dependent families and ascertaining their needs.

She reports that most of those now being helped are going to be considered as a loan, declaring that they will pay back the amounts upon receipt of their allowances.
