BOOZE TRAFFIC SEVERELY HIT BY DR. AVISON

Need of Immedite National Prohibition as War Measure Shown

SURVEY OF FACTS URGED

Minister Sees Injustice in Closed Schools and Open Breweries

In his Sunday morning sermon at the First Methodist church, Dr. R. N. Avison made a severe indicament of the liquor traffic in the United States, speaking on a basis of war conservation. He showed that every department of federal economy is affected by the traffic and that churches and schools have been compelled to close and homes to remain cold for want of fuel, while breweries have been allowed to run, consuming thousands of tons of soul and wasting millions of bushels of grain in the manufacture of liquor. This, Dr. Avison held to be unfair and inconsistent because of other drastics prohibitions that have been placed upon the people for the conservation of foodstuffs. He quoted from authoritative sources to show the disorganization of labor caused by drink and the consequent inter-English governments. Dr. Avison

"The war has forced upon the nafraught, with such direful consequences as that of alcoholism, There is not a question vital to the succesful consummation of the war that the liquor traffic does not affect harmfully. Food, munitions, fuel, shipping, everything that depends on the quality of labor is vitally involved in the manufacture and sale of intoxicants.

"Review the facts fairly and one must admit that the most effective strike in winning this war at a minimum cost in human life is immediate national prohibition. Such turers, industrial workers, churchmen and reformers, and ought to be demanded of the president and congress, as a prerequisite to a successful prosecution of the war.

Relation to Labor Shown. "The newspapers have reported that the shipbuilding program is doomed to fail owing to the difficulfore the senate military committee, said: 'We had a million men waiting to be sent to France. They are not on the way because we have not ships to send them Ships must be secured to carry men and supplies, or liberty goes to the wall. England has learned that with the increase in the war wage, drinking increased, and the output decreased. Just trenches for shells, more shells, munition factories complained to the ministry of munitions that the margin of lost time had been doubled. Whole gangs are thrown out owing to the absence of three or four hands -hands palsied by drink."

"The director of naval equipment reported that 'the condition of labor is so deplorable, owing to drink, that at any time the whole shipbuilding on the Tyne may come to a standstill,' and then nrged the total

closing of all public houses. "When the German submarine warfare began to tell, Admiral Jellico, in command of the British navy, wrote: 'I am very uneasy about the conditions on the Clyde. My destroyer dockings and refits are delayed in every case by these labor difficulties, and they take twice as long as they need to. "What has America to say? A leading manufacturer recently stated that in Syracuse, N. Y., a conference of employers estimated that in that city 10,000 days were lost every week because of the liquor traffic. If this represents the normal condition in wet territory generally, how enormous the loss in labor, and that at a time when labor is so vital to an early and successful termination of the war.

"General Pershing is reported in the American Issue, to have responded, when urged in San Antonio, Texas, to go slow in advocating prohibition: 'I shall not go slow on prohibition, for I know what is the greatest foe for my men-greater than the bullets of the enemy.'

Fuel Problem Affected. "Churches are closed, schools are closed, homes are cold, children are freezing because fuel cannot be obtained. And yet, during this same period, except for a few days covered by the recent fuel order, breweries and saloons have been running full time. According to a statement by E. L. Leach, assistant fuel administrator of Ohio, every pint of beer put out by the broweries requires the consumption of a pound of coal. In the state of New York alone, 2,365,856,512 pints of beer were manufactured in 1917, consuming in the manufacture sufficient coal to warm 131,600 homes, or a city of, 658,000 for six months. 
