AMERICA WILL OUTDO RUSSIA

Unionist Looks for Powerful Effect From New Energetic Ally

LONDON, Feb. 12.—When the house of commons reassembled at 4 o'clock this afternoon, Brigadier General Henry D. Webster, Unionist of North Westmorland, moved the address in reply to the King's speech. He said that during the last session there had occurred two events of world importance, the disappearance of Russia from the arena and the coming into it of the United States. Those events, when thrown into the scales counterbalanced one another, but he hoped for the weight of the full credit side from the United States.

The allies had a great deal to look for. America brought into the scale the weight of men and material, and energy and intelligence of inestimable value, and the whole of this force was impelled, not by the mere desire of conquest, but by a long considered and carefully thought out decision of a great and powerful nation, trusting their rulers, confident

in themselves and united in their intention to achieve their goal. The reply was seconded by Alexander Shaw, Liberal.

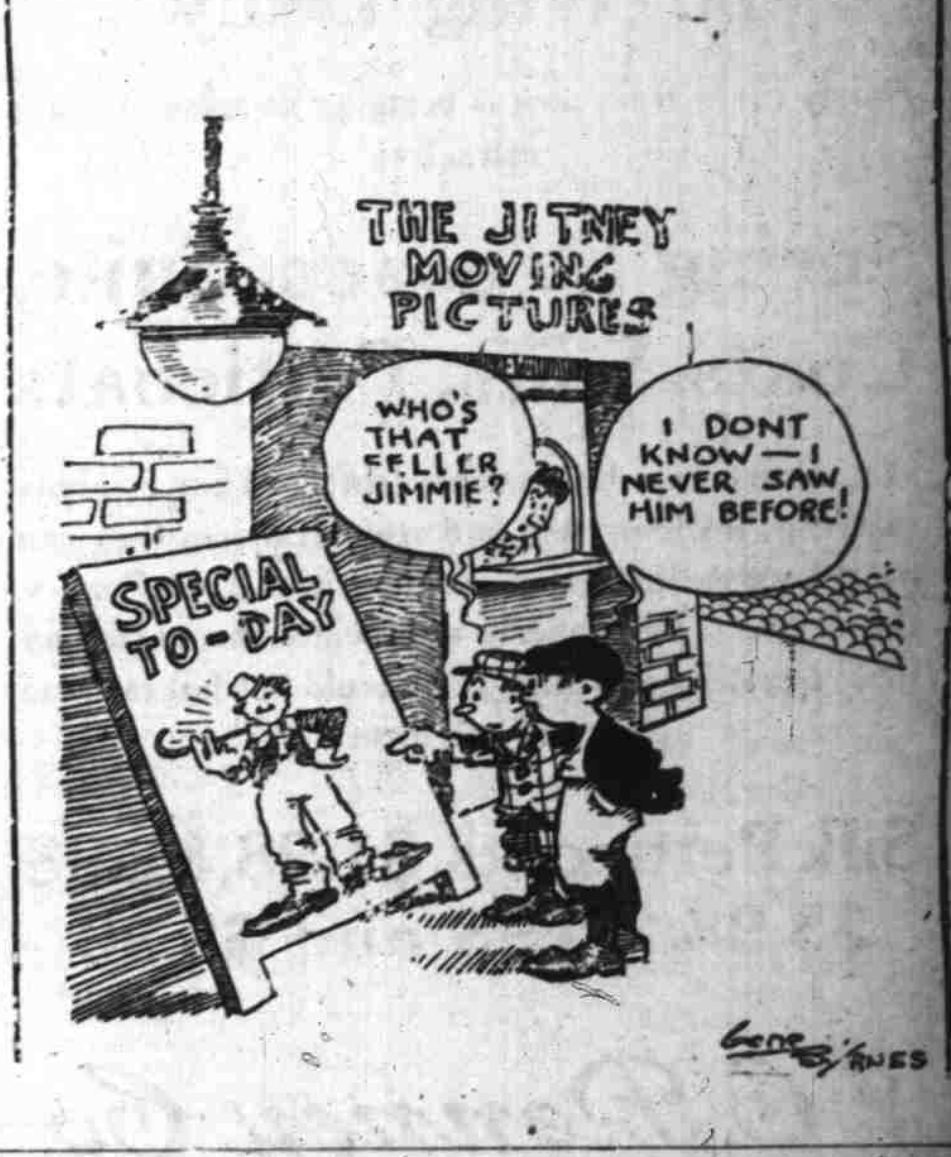
