HONOLULU, Jan. 30 .- (By Mail) The establishment of a munic pal fish market for the purpose of reducing the price and increasing the consumption of fish in Honolulu is proposed by Mayor Joseph J. Fern. of the interior. fish markets. Mayor Fern, who, is a Hawaiian, is an expert on fish and says that the prices at which the sea food sells in Honolulu are more than double what they seem to be. This condition he lays to what he says is "trust," a combination of white, Chinese and Japanese fishermen and venders. He believes that the establishment of a municipal fish market is the only way to remedy conditions.

The mayor's threat to establish such a market has already had its effect, fish having dropped from 35 and 40 cents a pound to an average of 25 cents.

Mayor Fern says, however, that it is possible to establish a fish market, pay the fishermen ten cents a pound for their catches, which would insure them a good profit, and retail the fish at not to exceed fifteen
