Camp Lewis Has Passed Through Five Months of **Great Revolution**

CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 15.—Five months have elapsed since Camp Lewis received its first quota of selective draft men, fresh from civilian life, to be given the military training necessary in the building of an army. In that com-parat ely short period the improvements in both the physical condition of the men, and their training camp have been marked. It is interesting to compare the camp of today with the partially completed camp which greeted the first contingents early in eptember, 1917.

Officers who had been assigned to organize the first units which the men were to form, were present to conduct the recruits to their regiment 1. The firt California contingent, for instance, was taken to the 363d infantry regiment which was subsequently entirely filled with men from the Colden state.
