TURKISH WIFE'S LEVEL IS HIGHER

Marriage and Divorce Have Become Subject to Stricter Laws

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 25.—Marriage and divorce in Turkey have become subject to much stricter laws than heretofore, according to information received here. A recent enactment makes the civil ceremony compulsory for Mohammedans, Christians and Jews alike. Priests of all confessions are no longer authorized to solemnize a marriage which has not been previously registered before a Turkish magistrate.

Polygamy is recognized by the new law; but should a Moslem wish to take unto himself a second wife, he may no longer divorce the first one upon the second bride's demand, as has been the practice. Under the old Turkish system, divorces were not difficult to obtain, and wives had few rights. The new law, however, places the wife's status on a much higher level. It provides that a reconciliation shall first be sought between the two parties for which purpose a special tribunal with a court of appeal has been instituted.

Westerners regard as one serious flaw in the new law the fact that it fixes the legal marrying age at 9 for the girl and 12 for the boy. True, the consent of the parents or guardians of the matrimonial candidates must be obtained until they are 17 and 18 years of age respectively; but it is recalled that the former Abdul Hamid, recognizing the evils of child marriage, ordained that 12 years should be the lowest marrying age for a girl. In this alone, the new law is reactionary.

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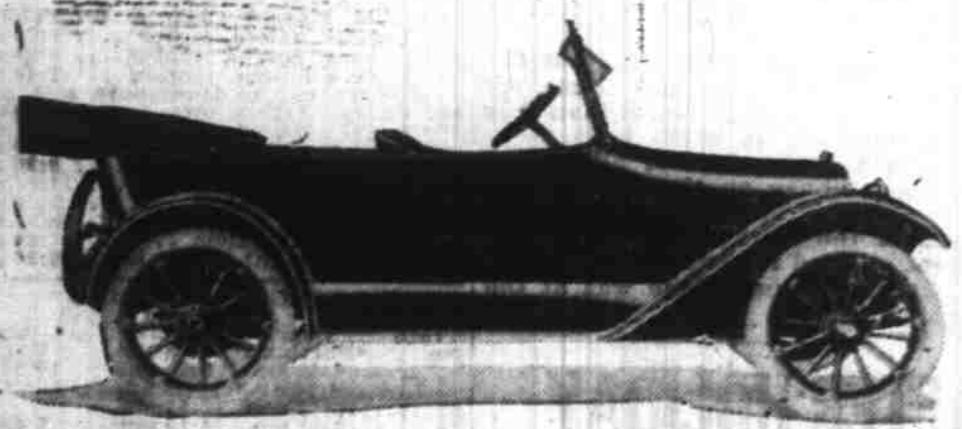
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
