Final touches on the roads through the ark are under way, grading and rolling having been nearly completed. tI is expected before the end of the summer to have the streets pay-

A new city, in center of camp ac tivities, will greet Major General H. A. Green, commander of the 91st division, when he returns next week from his trip to the war front. The project was only in the formative stage when he left camp.

The buildings at Greene park are built of Douglas fir, no two alike. and stained for the rustic effect. The equipment will be complete and add materially to the enjlyment of the men at camp.

In addition to the present concessions, a hotel is under construction in which will be 400 rooms connecting with bath, 250 with private bath and 200 without bath. H. F. Proctor, manager of the company in charge of the park, said today there probably will be 800 employes of the park who probably will stay at the camp and with the large number of officers desiring accommodations there, plans are under way for construction of additional units to the

When the park is completed, there will be a motion picture theater and vaudeville theater which with the Liberty theater, under the direction of Colonel E, A. Braden, will give Camp Lewis men considérable in the way of entertainment.
