Dr. J. E. Anderson of The Dalles yesterday filed with Secretary of State Olcott his declaration of intention to be a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor at the May primary elections. ### Highway Project in Union County Approved Yesterday

The public service commission was informed yesterday that the governor has approved federal aid project No. 5, which is the Elgin-Minam road in Union county. The plans call for 9.3 miles of grading at an estimated cost of \$36,094. The work will be under the Bean-Barrett bond act in co-operation with the government.

### Railroads Relieved of Application of Statute

By an order of the public service commission yesterday Oregon railroads are relieved of application of the statute requiring that changes in existing schedules, including schedules of joint rates, shall be posted conspicuously by the companies in every depot where an agent is maintained. The statute gives the commission power to suspend or modify the application of the law.

### Governor's Son Is Still in Dangerous Condition

A letter received by Governor Withycombe yesterday from his daughter, Miss Mabel Withycombe, indicates that the governor's son, Earl Withycombe, is still dangerously ill in a hospital in Washington, D. C. He has been confined to his bed for several weeks as a result of illness contracted while in an army cantonment in Virginia.

### Jack Elliott Has Thrill While Flying in Aeroplane

Jack Elliott, who is in the aviation service, tells a thrilling experience in a letter to his father, State Forester F. A. Elliott. With an observer, Elliott was flying at a high distance from the ground, when his engine went wrong. Fearing a fire he made a "nose dive" for the ground and landed safely by maneuvering his machine skillfully. The plane was not damaged. Elliott loosened his belt so that he would be able to jump if necessary and told the observer to do the same, but the predicament had caused the observer to faint. Young Elliott writes his further that he has qualified in machine gunnery.
