





MAKES ESCAPE AL Runner in Turnkey's Office Walks Away From Prison ES After Supper Hour Arthur Waters, a trusty who was employed as a runner in the office sh of the turnkey at the state penitentiary, made his escape last night between 7:30 and 9 o'clock. He was committed from Multnomah county July 6, 1917, to serve from one to seven years for larceny from a dwelling. A SHORT BUT STRONG

STATEMENT.

It is not necessary, on behalf of the state, to ascertain whether a contractor erecting a state building has paid his sub-contractors before settlement is made with the contractor, according to an opinion of Attorney General Brown in reply to a question put by J. H. Ackerman. president of Oregon Normal school President Ackerman asked if the state is liable for the contractor's debts if he does not pay his sub-contractors. Reference is made to a contract with the state board of trustees for normal schools for the construction of new buildings at the Monmouth institution.

The opinion says it is usual, however, to require a waiver from the surety on the contractor's bond if final settlement is made prior to the time specified in the contract, so that if any suit or action should be sommenced upon the bond there will be no question of defense on account of premature judgment. No suit can be made against the state with-
