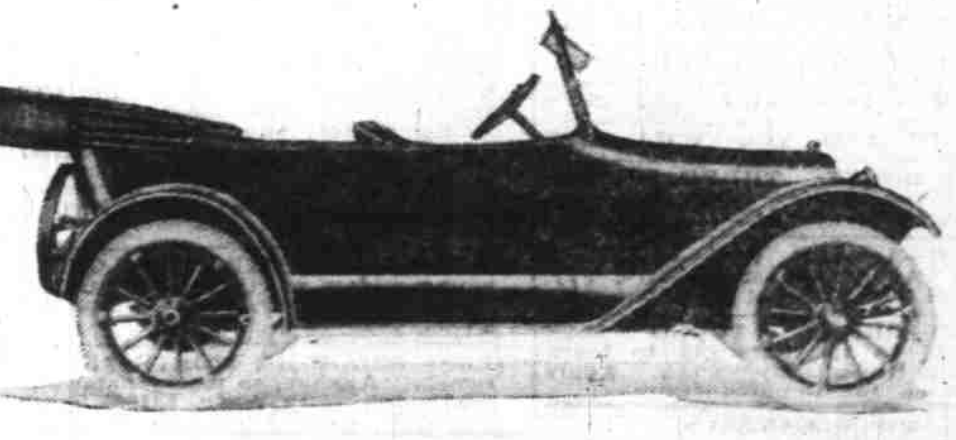
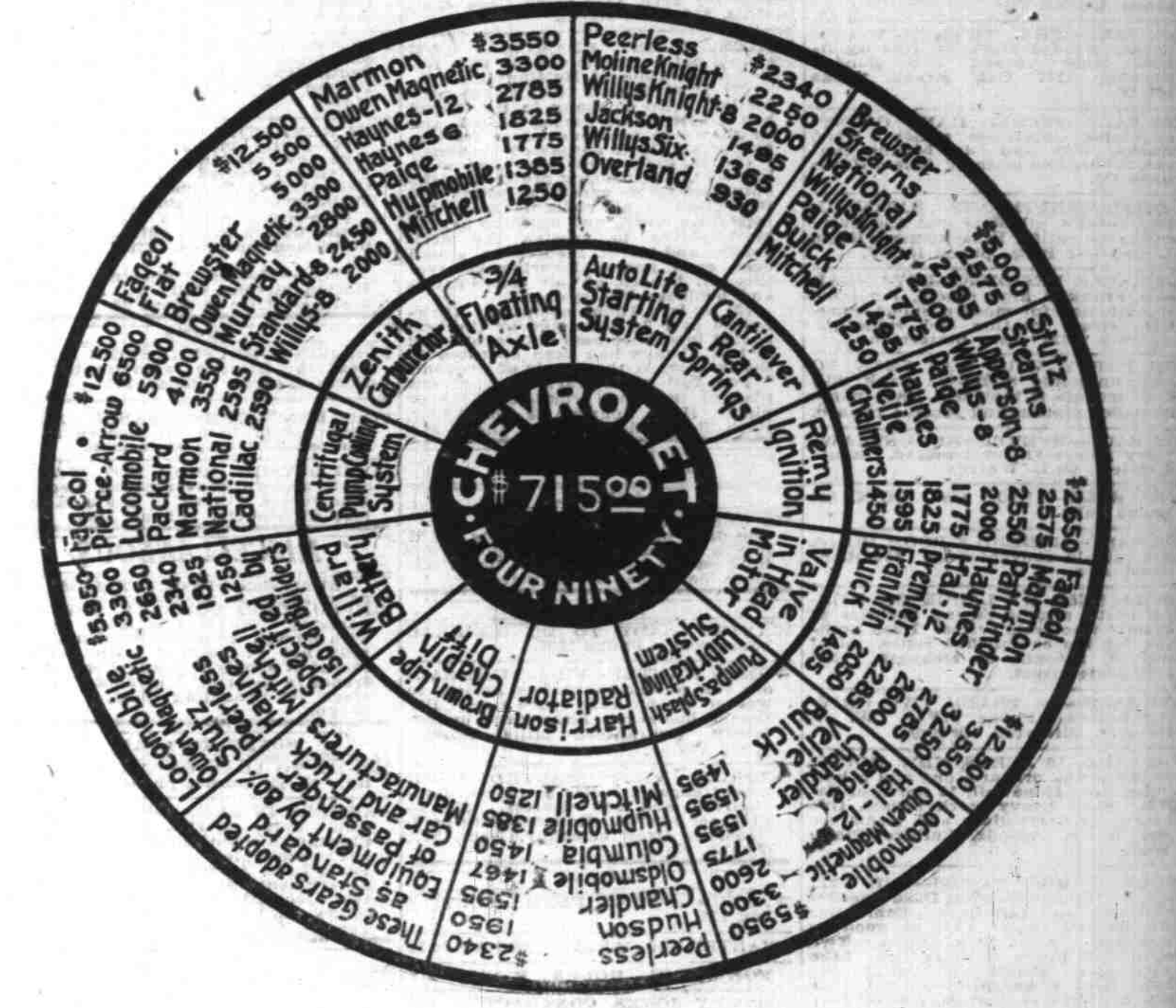
Special Motor Cars for Men of Army and Navy
