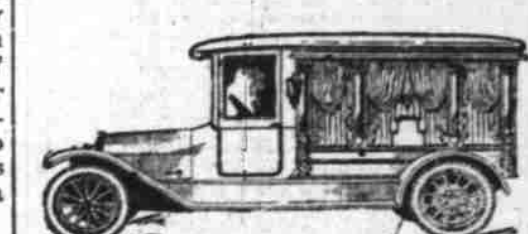
OREGON STATUTE NOT UNDERSTOOD

Attorney General Calls Congressman's Attention to Error

Attorney General Brown in a letter to Congressman Hawley yesterday informs him that none but citizens had the right to vote in Oregon and that aliens having first papers only do not have the right. The attorney general's attention was called to the subject by press dispatches relative to a bill now pending in congress in which it was stated that Oregon was one of ten states where aliens with first papers have the right of suffrage. The right was limited to full-fledged citizens by an amendment to Section 2, Article II of the State constitution at the election of 1914.

The error relative to Oregon Attorney General Brown has been called upon to correct several times the declaration of war, and the erroneous understanding of the Oregon law has been so general that requests have come to the governor to call a special session of the legislature for the purpose of enacting
