Absence of exports from the market remained a depressing infleunce. Industries, however, were good buyers.

Oats weakened under persistent selling by discouraged longs, with bears inclined to be more aggressive. Provisions ranged lower mainly be cause of the heavy average of hogs arrivals and as a result of the continued plentiful supply.
