WOOL SHIPMENTS INTO GERMANY

Inquiry Starts on Alleged Teutonic Corner on Supplies in U. S.

MANY ORDERS RECEIVED

German Scheme to Outdo Great Britain's Embargo to Be Exposed -

NEW YORK, March 15 .- Wool shipments to Germany in exchange for dyes badly needed in this country were endorsed early in the war by the American state department, according to testimony given at the opening today of Attorney General Lewis' inquiry into an alleged conspiracy to obtain for Teutonic interests a dominating position in the world's textile markets after the war

The witness who made the assertion was Julius Forstman, the naturalized German head of a Passaic, N. J., firm of woolen manufacturers. He admitted, however, that he had acted as agent for German interests in wool purchases after March 26, 1915, the date on which American woolen manufacturers voluntarily submitted to regulations imposed by the Textile Alliance, Nuc., a quasiofficial agency created at the instance of the British government to control consumption of textiles from British colonial possessions so that none of these materials would reach

Germany. Bryan Endorses Shipments. Early in his examination Forstman said he had vinstructions from Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador, to take orders from H. F. Albert, then fiscal agent of the German government in this city, "in all matters relating to wool shipments" during the time the United States remained neutral, He maintained that the transactions for German interests were legal as they had the approval of the state depart ment in agreement with the German embassy at Washington.

The witness declared William J Bryan, then secretary of state, endorsed the shipments because, in exchange for the wool, Germany released quantities of dye stuffs which were sorely needed by the American

manufacturers. Forstman declared that after h firm, on March 28, 1915, submitted itself to import and export regulations imposed by the Textile Alliance he made no purchases or shipmen; of wool for German account except on contracts negotiated up to that time. Deputy Attorney General Becker, who questioned the witness held that this would constitute a technical violation of the firm' agreements.

The penalty for such violation, ac cording to Mr. Becker, is the cancellation of the license under which the offending company has been per mitted to carry on its importing o exporting business.

German Scheme to Be Exposed. Mr. Becker has stated that he ex pects to show during the investigation that when embargo regulations imposed by Great Britain became ev en more stringent through the en trance of the United States into th war. Germany schemed to accumulate stocks of weel, cotton and jut in the United States, South America Australia and South Africa, which were to be gotten through to Ger many when peace was concluded or

This was to be accomplished, h asserts, by subsidizing American firms in possession of trading privi leges who acted as nominal purchas

### Attorney General Brown Rules on Inheritance Law

In a ruling on the Oregon inheriance tax law, Chapter 372, Laws of 1917, Attorney General Brown holds that exemption applies only to inheritances of not more than \$5000 and that for inheritances of more than \$5000 the tax applies only to the amount in excess of \$5000.
