Secretary Wilson in his letter to the newspapers says: "There is no more worthy demand than the farmers' for help to produce the nation's food."

"In this emergency I am asking the patriots help of the 736 daily newspapers of these cities to establish cooperative farm labor agencies. The plan of organization is outlined in the attached memorandum."

Eighty-Six Men Held for Alleged Agitation Among Lumber-Workers

ST. MARIES, Idaho, March 21.—United States army soldiers who have been on patrol duty here since Saturday following the attempt of Industrial Workers of the World to release members of their organization from the county jail, departed tonight for Fort George Wright, near Spokane.

Eighty-six men, who were arrested in connection with the attempt to release prisoners from jail and by the home guards for alleged activities among the lumber workers, are being held here, twenty-seven in the county jail and fifty-nine in a brick building to which they were moved today from a paint shop.

United States District Attorney J. L. McClear, according to a message

from Governor Alexander, departed from Boise tonight and will arrive here Saturday to take charge of the investigation of alleged Industrial Workers who may be wanted on federal charges.

Home guard detachments continued their search in the Benewah county logging camps for organizers and agitators.
