#### Staff Members of 736 Dailies to Act as Federal Agents for U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 21 .- The id of 736 daily newspapers was asked by Secretary of Labor Wilson today in mobilizing farm labor. They will be branches of the federal employment service and a member of the staff on each paper will be made a federal agent. The newspapers asked the those in towns of over 20,-600 population.

Secretary Wilson in his letter to he newspapers says:

"There is no more worthy demand than the farmers' for help to produce the nation's food. The department of labor, cooperating with the department of agriculture, is extending its United States employing service to find all available labor and correlate every activity toward meeting this demand. 'The postmaster general has au-

thorized rural carriers and postmasters in rural communities and smaller towns to aid the employment service as labor agents. But over 100 of the 316 American cities above 20,-000 population have no public employment office, and in many such offices there is no special farm service given. There is hardly time to open and train the needed officers fo this season's farm needs,
