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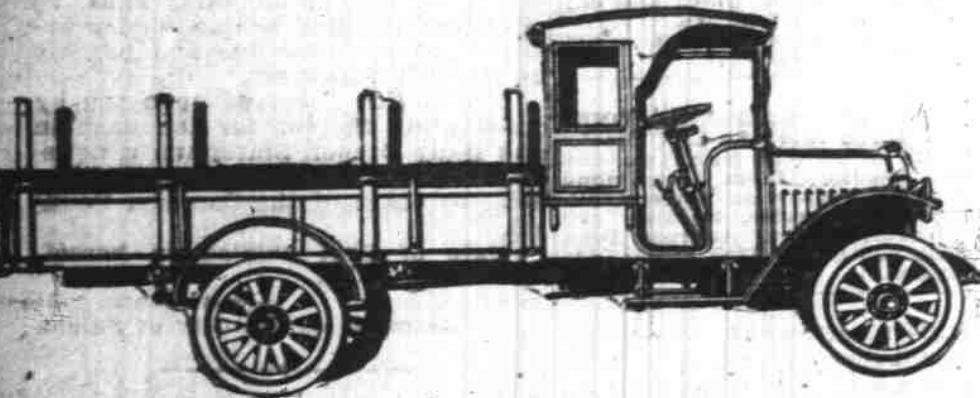

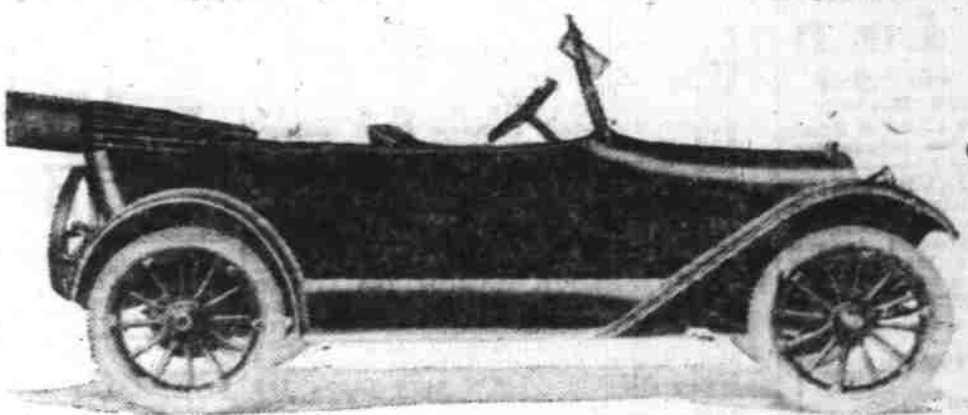

has charge of the project, proposed to divert the water of the several lateral branch streams of Willamette creek, through a pipe line four and one-half miles in length, at an approximate cost of \$48,000.

The largest irrigation project undertaken during the last quarter was that of R. R. Benham, whose offices are in California. The company contemplates the irrigation of 18,000 acres of land in Lane county, for which they propose to use the waters

of the McKenzie river, stored in Fish and Clear lakes. The cost of the project will be \$270,000. The Cornucopia Mines company of Baker has secured the right to appropriate the waters of Elk, Jim Fiske and Fall creeks to develop 455 horsepower for hydro-electric plant in that vicinity. The water will be diverted through a pipe line, two miles in length, at an approximate cost of \$20,000.

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Williams Again Running for National Committee

Ralph E. Williams of Portland yesterday filed with Secretary of State Olegg declaration of his candidacy for Republican national committeeman. In his platform he declares:

"I stand for re-united Republican party. I shall do my best to promote its welfare. I belong to no factions. My sole purpose will be to elect the entire ticket, state and national, as nominated. My past experience as national committeeman should enable me to render valuable service to the party. In support of this I have letters from ex-Chairman Wilcox of the Republican national committee; George W. Perkins, chairman executive committee, Progressive party, and Will H. Hays, present chairman of Republican national committee."

Statement Shows Permits Issued in First Quarter

One hundred five permits were issued by John H. Lefis, state engineer, during the first quarter of the year 1918. These permits included the irrigation of land aggregating 27,723 acres, the development of 501 horsepower, and water supply for one municipality. The estimated cost of construction for these projects totaled \$423,350.

The municipality which will receive water supply under the proposed project is Crawford Point, in Coos county. The Portland, Eugene & Coos Bay Land company, which
