

## W. W. TRIAL TO LAST SIX WEEKS

Anti-War Activities of 112 Members to Be Carefully Examined

CHICAGO, April 5.—Eight jurors have been tendered by the government to the defense and four of them have been tentatively accepted by both sides when the trial of 112 leaders and organizers of the Industrial Workers of the World, charged with plotting to destroy war industries by strikes, adjourned tonight.

The defense exercised the first of its ten preemptory challenges when counsel for the government asked that the first four jurors agreed upon be sworn. William Mallow, of Chicago, an employer of labor, was excused.

Renewed efforts to speed up selection of a jury followed complaints from some of the one hundred veniremen that their business connections make it essential that they return promptly or arrange for their absence during the trial. Night sessions may be held beginning next week.

"Judging from the evidence on hand, the trial should be concluded in a month or six weeks," said Frank K. Nebeker, of counsel for the government tonight.

"Benjamin H. Williams, former editor of 'Solidarity,' and I. W. W. publication, who was arrested in Cleveland by federal officers on the indictment returned by the federal grand jury last September, will be brought to Chicago immediately.

"Unless Williams exercises his right to protest that the trial is being held under way, he will be tried with the rest of the defendants," said Claude R. Porter, special assistant attorney general.

Prospective jurors examined by the government have been questioned closely as to their ancestors, the newspapers and magazines they read, their sympathies in the war before America entered and their present activities in the prosecution of the war. The government used the third of its six preemptory challenges today to excuse a venireman whose views did not satisfy the prosecution.

Of the first seven prospective jurors examined the government excused three because of their past or present views on the war.

For the first time in five months, eighty-eight of the defendants enjoyed their evening meal outside the county jail. Under heavy guard they were fed by the government at the federal building as a result of a petition to Judge Landis protesting against food provided at the jail.

County jail officials said the men were given wholesome food, that in addition they received baskets of fruit and other provisions daily through the organization and that they were, as a whole, the most untroubled lot ever confined in the jail.

"They have thrown bread at the guards when the entire country was striving to save bread for our soldiers," said Will T. Davies, jailer.

### CAMP LEWIS NOTES

CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, April 5.—The number of drafted men received at Camp Lewis during the past week exceeds by more than 200 the Camp Lewis quota of the special draft of 95,000 men to fill up units of the national army in all cantonments. This afternoon 417 had been received and there was one contingent of twenty-one from California yet to come. The original quota for Camp Lewis was 3973.

The fact that the number of new men exceeded the quota is accounted for by the arrival of a number of specially inducted men and others who have been sent to take the places of men discharged for physical disability, because they were enemy aliens or for other reasons. The number of such arrivals averages thirty a day, it was said at the receiving station of the casual office, where the men are taken upon their arrival here.

Today was a light day for casualties. No large units of drafted men came in and scattering districts in Utah, Wyoming, Idaho and California supplied the day's addition of nineteen to the army.

Second Lieutenant Raymond P. Hartney has been relieved of duty as aide de camp to Brigadier General Edward Burr, commander of the 166th field artillery brigade, and has been assigned to the 346th field artillery.

The formal presentation of the Knights of Columbus trophy, a silver soccer ball, to the soccer team

of the 363rd infantry, champions of the 91st division, will be made next Thursday night at a social affair at the Knights of Columbus building No. 1. The 363rd infantry won the championship Wednesday by defeating the 362nd infantry after having twice played tied games for the honors. The trophy was donated by members of the Knights of Columbus in the northwest.

Soldiers of the 91st division were advised in a memorandum from headquarters of a plan which has been provided by the war department for carrying money with them abroad, getting regular remittances from banks and sending home money to their families. The plan is said to be more convenient than the letters of credit and travelers' checks which prevailed among tourists abroad previous to the war.

Money to be available for use of soldiers abroad must be sent by check or through the soldiers' bank to the Farmers' Loan and Trust company in New York, which has been named public depository, with instructions and six sample signatures. Through the Paris and London agencies of the bank, periodical payments may be arranged in France or remittances be arranged through the foreign agents of the bank for the families of military men. In the latter case, transfer advices are mailed in duplicate, so that the chance for loss of the advices is minimized.

The plan was devised after conferences between military authorities who have had experience with money difficulties abroad since the war. Y. M. C. A. secretaries and representatives of other organizations connected with the war activities.

The baseball fever has hit the army chaplains here. The Y. M. C. A. secretaries met the chaplains this afternoon on the diamond back of the Butte building, the new gymnasium, and defeated the clericalmen 11 to 10 in a game which went two extra innings to break a tie score. The chaplains showed their ball-playing qualities by hounding the umpire until he was ready to quit.

The headquarters detachment and headquarters troop of the division will have a team in the regimental league. Plans for a team are to be laid at a baseball meeting in headquarters Monday evening.

## OAKLAND PLAYS ERRORLESS BALL

Third Game Straight Is Won From San Francisco Team; O'Doul Is Wild

## S. P. COMPANY TO BUY BONDS

Officials Urge Employees to Invest Liberally in Securities

PORTLAND, Ore., April 5.—(Special to The Statesman)—The machinery of the Southern Pacific system was put in motion today in support of the third liberty loan. President William Sproule announced to the 45,000 employees of the Pacific system that the company will again care for the bonds for those employees who desire to participate in the loan.

At the same time, telegraphic instructions were issued along the line to begin taking subscriptions at once. It is expected that the same good-natured rivalry will be shown by the various divisions as characterized in the previous campaigns. According to the announcement, the company will purchase bonds on the new loan for those of its employees who desire to subscribe and will permit these bonds to be paid for in installments over a period of ten months. This would be at the rate of \$10 a month for a \$100 bond.

In the first liberty loan, employees of the Southern Pacific lines purchased bonds to the extent of \$1,318,800. In the second loan they participated to the extent of \$1,843,700. This made a total of \$3,162,500 subscribed already by the employees of this one railroad system. Confidence is expressed that the response of the Southern Pacific employees will be as prompt and unanimous as ever.

The message wired to the officials of the line from San Francisco today read:

"Campaign for subscriptions to third liberty loan opens tomorrow. Bonds will be issued in same denominations as before and bear 4 1/2 percent interest. Where employees wish to time on a subscription we will buy their bonds and allow them to repay in monthly installments extending over ten months is desired. Make active canvass for subscriptions and organize thoroughly for campaign in order to improve on our previous record. Success of loan is needful for victory. Impress this upon every employee. Company and government alike look forward with certainty to final result of this loan campaign for us."

## ETHEL REDFIELD IS CHOSEN HEAD

Inland Empire Association Wants National Educational Secretary

SPOKANE, Wash., April 5.—Miss Ethel E. Redfield, state superintendent of public instruction for Idaho, was elected president of the Inland Empire Teachers' association at the closing session of the annual convention here this afternoon. J. M. Hamilton, president of the Montana State college at Bozeman, was elected vice president, and J. E. Buchanan of the faculty of the State Normal school at Cheney, Wash., was elected treasurer. The secretary will be named by the executive committee.

Members of the executive committee were chosen as follows: D. A. Grout, city superintendent of schools at Eugene, Ore., four years; Henry M. Hart, principal of the Lewis and Clark high school, Spokane, three years; F. L. Cummings, superintendent of schools for Pergus county, Montana, two years; George A. Axline, president of the States Normal school at Albion, Idaho, one year.

Members of the educational council are E. H. Lindner, president of the University of Idaho, for Idaho; Chancellor E. C. Elliott of Helena, for Montana; Miss Margaret Yost for Washington, and N. R. Rutherford for Oregon. A suggestion that the name of the organization be changed to the Northwestern Educational association was voted down.

Resolutions passed this afternoon ask congress for the creation of a national secretary of education with a seat in the cabinet; endorse the principles of the Smith-Hughes federal aid act; favor increase of teachers' salaries to keep pace with the advancing cost of living; oppose shortening of the school year; favor maintenance of the high standard of education; pledge the support of the teachers to the government in the war, and appeal to educators to impress upon the people to abide by the processes of law and order.

At a meeting this afternoon of college and university heads of the northwest arrangements were made for a conference at Tacoma April 25, 26 and 27, to consider the educational needs of national army men at northwestern cantonments. A telegram was sent to the war department asking information in regard to the assignment of soldiers to institutions of learning for technical education during the coming summer.

## LANSING WANTED AT HINDU TRIAL

Hindus Make Written Plea for Service of Secretary of State

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—A written plea that he use his best efforts in bringing Secretary of State Robert Lansing here to testify on their behalf was handed United States District Judge William C. Van Fleet here today by a number of Hindus who are on trial before him on a charge of conspiring in this country to overthrow British rule in India. The plea stated that if the presence of Mr. Lansing could not

be secured a deposition from him would be sufficient.

Judge Van Fleet said at the close of the court session that he would not rule on the pleas until he had examined it thoroughly.

In the plea the Hindus said they would be willing to be hanged if such sacrifice would be for the welfare of this country "which has offered our people an asylum and liberty."

Answers to two questions are sought of Mr. Lansing, the plea stated.

The questions were: Did the British government demand an indemnity from the American government as the result of the Hindu revolutionary activities here? Is the British government continuing its inquiry into Hindu revolutionary activities here?

The plea concludes: "If your honor please neither our personal advantage nor the cause we represent will be best served either by an acquittal or the release of the defendants, but by bringing to light the truth, even though because of the truth we would suffer conviction for the sake of our principles and be thrown to prison and hanged. Such punishment indeed we would gladly suffer if it be for the welfare of this country, which has offered our people asylum and liberty, and that is that the truth be known."

The Hindus also ask for the judge to ascertain, if possible, what action has been taken in regard to sending the Hindustan Ghadr, a local organ of the Hindus, through the mails. The plea was signed by Ram Chandra, co-editor of the Ghadr, and six of his co-defendants.

## MAXIMUM PRICES ARE SET FOR FIRE

\$40 a Thousand to Be Averaged on Government and Allied Orders

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Maximum prices for fir logs and lumber and yellow pine on government or allied order were announced today by the new price-fixing committee of the war industries board.

The new prices for fir logs, forty feet or less, in the Pacific northwest, effective between March 19 and next May 31 are \$19 per thousand for No. 1 logs; \$15.50 for No. 2 logs, and \$10 for No. 3 logs, for delivery at points where it has been customary to make delivery to sawmill operators. For logs of more than 40 feet the price will be on the same basis for extra lengths as established by custom.

The price for fir ship timbers under the Ferris schedule to the emergency fleet corporation will be readjusted at item prices that will average \$40 per thousand for a complete schedule for both rough and dressed items. All sales of lumber for other ships under government contract requiring similar timber will be on the same basis.

## 27 MEMBERS OF I. W. W. CAUGHT IN SPOKANE TRAP

Police Make Wholesale Arrests at Headquarters and Loafing Places

### LITERATURE IS SEIZED

Raids Conducted After Governor Lister Refuses to Send Soldiers

SPOKANE, April 5.—As the result of wholesale arrests by members of the Spokane police force today of alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World, 27 men taken in raids on district headquarters of the organization and loafing places of members are held by the police tonight for trial in municipal or federal court.

The raids by the police today followed a conference of city commissioners yesterday, after Governor Lister had offered to take over the police and sheriff forces of the city and county and curb the activities of the Industrial workers here but had refused to send soldiers, as the city and county officials had requested him to do.

Of 94 men arrested today, 19 were charged with vagrancy at the close of an examination of the individual prisoners by the police and federal officials. Six were held as aliens, one was held as an alien and for failure to comply with the selective service law, and one was held for distributing literature illegally. Several of the prisoners, it was announced, were found not to be members of the Industrial Workers of the World and were released.

The greatest number of the prisoners were arrested at the district headquarters of Agricultural Workers Industrial Union No. 400, where 76 were taken into custody. Only five were taken from the district headquarters of Lumber Workers Union No. 500, and 12 others were arrested in a poolhall frequented by members of the organization. A quantity of I. W. W. literature and records were seized.

Participating in the examination of the prisoners this afternoon were Chief of Police W. C. Weir, Detective Captain Martin Burns, City Prosecuting Attorney Arthur Hooper and other police department officials and Immigration Inspector A. W. Roehardson.

### TEUTONS PUSH BIG ATTACK ON ALLIES

the sacrifice of lives which they have cost. Just to the southwest of Albert, the British have withdrawn a short distance and the French have given up the village of Castel, west of Moreuil, which has been the storm center of the German assaults for the last few days. At this point the Teutons are within three miles of the Paris-Amiens road.

Berlin Swells Claims. The German official statement that successes both north and south of the Somme have been won and that the number of prisoners taken since the beginning of the drive has increased to 90,000 and the guns captured now total 1390.

It seems probable that the entente allies have abandoned their Fabian tactics and now are prepared to give battle to the Germans. They have fixed their lines about twelve miles east of the city of Amiens and it is evident that here they have turned at bay against the invaders. The contour of the country back of the allied lines lends itself to defensive tactics. It is quite high and is of a character which compels attacking forces to expose themselves to concentrations of fire from artillery and infantry.

Sectors Vital to Allies. It is necessary for the Germans to break through the British and the French lines in this region or to flank the allies by a drive to the north and south of it. The fighting near Albert and north of Montdidier seems to have for its object the turning of the allied positions. That the Albert and Moreuil sectors are vital to the allied defense is shown by the

stern resistance maintained there in the last two days.

The dawning of the first anniversary of the entry of the United States into the war finds General Pershing's veterans somewhere in the battle zone. How many are there, what units have been chosen for the fight and where they will make their first appearance is not known. It is probable, however, that an American army of some proportions is either actually in the struggle or is held in reserve immediately behind the lines.

Allies Regain Ground. The allies have struck back at the Germans and have regained some ground near Grivesnes, a short distance northwest of Montdidier and at Noyon, near the village of Orville-Sore. It is in this latter region that the great allied counter-attack has been expected to be launched.

It was announced at London on Friday that a Japanese force had been landed at Vladivostok, the eastern terminus of the trans-Siberian railroad. It is explained that the incident is without political significance and is not to be looked upon as intervention by the allies in Russia.

Germans Fail, Says London. LONDON, April 5.—Strong attacks by the German infantry between the Somme and the vicinity of Bucquoy met with virtually no success, according to the British official statement this evening.

Heavy casualties were inflicted on the Germans.

The official statement reads: "This morning the activity of the enemy's artillery and trench mortars increased north of the Somme and was followed by a series of strong infantry attacks all along that portion of the battle front which lies between the Somme and Bucquoy. The latest reports indicate these attacks met with virtually no success anywhere and have resulted in further heavy casualties to the enemy."

PARIS, April 5.—The Germans did not resume their attacks north of Montdidier during the course of the day. Our troops have by vigorous counter-attacks succeeded in improving their positions at several points, notably in the regions of Mailly-Rameval and Cantigny, the north and west outskirts of which towns are in the hands, says and official statement issued tonight by the war office.

Berlin Claims Turkish Success. BERLIN, via London, April 5.—German and Turkish troops northeast of Jericho have driven back the British troops which had crossed the Jordan river according to an official communication issued today. The text of the communication says:

"Asiatic theater: German troops have repulsed, in conjunction with Ottoman forces, English infantry and cavalry brigades after they had crossed the Jordan at Es-Salt and pressed forward toward Amman, and driven them back toward the Jordan in a battle lasting many days."

The British official communication several days ago said the British forces in the region of Es-Salt had withdrawn after they had achieved their objectives, which included the cutting of the Hejaz railway.

## COMPANY F SWEARS IN

About One Hundred Men Sign Up for New Military Organization

Patriotic enthusiasm was as thick as the clear smoke in the atmosphere of the commercial club auditorium last night as a continuous line of citizens came and went, signing up the blank blanks for membership in Salem's new home guard organization of business men to be known as Company F. A. A. Hall will be captain of the new company, M. L. Meyers first lieutenant, and Robert B. Duncan second lieutenant.

In the course of the meeting last night a total of about 100 business men signed the blanks, and it is expected that not less than twenty-five more will be enrolled within the next few days. A committee composed of M. L. Meyers, A. A. Hall and E. H. Choate will have the matter in charge, and any citizen who wishes to join the company can secure the blanks from them. Citizens are urged to be prompt in getting into line.

Another meeting will be called some time within a week at which time all details will be arranged and the formation of the new company formally announced, possibly with something in the way of "trimmings."

The body of the blank form gives the name, age and occupation of the

recruit and acknowledges his voluntary enlistment as a soldier for the period of two years unless sooner discharged by proper authority, and goes on to pledge the subscriber "to accept from the state of Oregon such bounty, pay, rations, and clothing as are or may be established by law. And I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the United States of America and the state of Oregon, and that I will serve them honestly and faithfully against all their enemies whomsoever within the state of Oregon; and that I will obey the orders of the governor of the state of Oregon, and the orders of the officers appointed over me, according to the rules and articles of war, and the military code of Oregon, so help me God."

## HERBERT HATCH DIES SUDDENLY

Former Member of State Fair Board Expires While Sitting in Chair

Herbert W. Hatch, a former member of the Oregon state fair board and of the city council, passed away suddenly yesterday at his home, 1835 Center street. He was 63 years old and had lived in Salem for about thirty years.

Mr. Hatch was apparently in good health. He had been about his work at his home during the early morning. He had even laughed and joked with his wife, although she felt that he was not as well as usual. She was writing a letter for him and Mr. Hatch was sitting in a nearby chair when the end suddenly came about 10:30 o'clock. Death was due to heart failure.

For many years Mr. Hatch was the head miller in the local branch of the Portland Flouring mills. For the past two years he has been in the paving business. He had served four years as a member of the state fair board and six years with the city council. He was not a member of any religious organization.

Mr. Hatch was born February 25, 1855, in Connecticut, Ohio. He was married in Mankato, Minnesota, to Miss Lou R. Wood, thirty-six years ago. Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, Harold Hatch of North Bend, and a daughter, Mrs. T. U. Stimson of Portland.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 12:45 o'clock from the Rigdon chapel under the auspices of the First Church of Christ, Scientist. The body will be taken to Portland for cremation.

Germany. It is a righteous war, waged by our people. No more inspiring exhibition of patriotism was ever made than the response by them to the requests of President Wilson that they contribute to its support by purchasing our government's obligations. He knows us not who doubts that the response will be far beyond the amount required."

Secretary Redfield of the department of commerce: "Buying liberty bonds makes our homes safer, our business more secure, helps maintain America against enemies who mock at our power and think us weaker because we respect the rights of others."

Secretary Wilson of the department of labor:

"The third liberty loan has an even greater significance than the first two. They were the expression of instant and responsive patriotism. This carries a grim notice on the foe that America is in the fight until the lives of its people are safe from the assaults of barbarism, its institutions secure against the attacks of autocracy, and the nations of the earth, including our own, and assured the opportunity of living their own lives undisturbed by the power of militarism."

### Chinnock Not Candidate; Copper to Run for Place

James T. Chinnock, who since 1910 has been superintendent of water division No. 1, announced yesterday that he will not be a candidate for re-election. Early next year he will go to Grants Pass to practice law.

Percy A. Copper, assistant state engineer, expects to become a candidate for the office now held by Chinnock. H. E. Abery of St. Helens has already filed his candidacy for the place.

Chinnock took the office by election in 1910. He has been admitted to the bar since that time.
