DALLAS, Or., April 5.—(Special to The Statesman).—F. E. Davis, councilman for the third ward, this week moved into property recently purchased by him on Birch street, and consequently surrendered his position on the city council. Mr. Davis was appointed to fill the unexpired term of J. E. Miller, who resigned, and it will now be up to the city council to appoint a man to take his place. Davis' term would have expired this fall and it is probable that the council will not fill the office and let the people elect a successor at the general city election in November.

**Two Fatalities Reported to Commission Last Week**

A total of 466 accidents was reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending April 4, of which two were fatal. Sam D. Clark of Philomath was killed while logging and A. Emerson a railroad man, was killed at Kerry. Of the total number of accidents, 434 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act. Twenty-one were from firms and corporations that have not come under the act.

**State Hatchery Site in Clackamas Sold**

Attorney General Brown yesterday drew up a deed for the transfer by the state fish and game commission of 16 acres of the state's land in Clackamas county to Marie White for a consideration of \$250. The deed has been sent to the governor for his signature. The tract was the site chosen for a proposed fish hatchery on Salmon river, which, it is reported, has been abandoned. Attorney General Brown has ruled that the agent who negotiated the deal must file a claim for his commission and not be paid directly by the commission from the proceeds of the sale.

**APPEAL FILED IN 6-CENT CASE**

Hearing May Not Be Given by Court Until After Pendleton Trip

The city of Portland yesterday filed in the supreme court its appeal by the 6-cent fare case in which the city is appellant and the state public service commission respondent. The case involves the question of jurisdiction of the service commission in making an order allowing the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to increase its street car fares from 5 to 6 cents. The commission won a unanimous decision of six judges in the lower court.

The city was filed through the mail by City Attorney W. P. La Roche of Portland. It is the intention of the attorneys to have the case advanced on the supreme court's calendar, but it is now apparent that hearing cannot be given until after the supreme court returns from Pendleton where the eastern Oregon session will be held the first week in May.

The office of Attorney General Brown suggested to Attorneys La Roche and M. L. Pipes that notice of appeal be filed in two or three days after decision of the lower court so that the case could be advanced on the supreme court docket before the briefs were filed. It is now more than three weeks since the lower court's action and the city's briefs are yet to be filed. The attorney general's office will need at least two weeks in which to file its briefs after the briefs of the city are filed.

**Market Is Difficult for Cattle Having Tuberculosis**
