BROWN AGAIN
IS CANDIDATE
FOR POSITION

Attorney General Has Reputation of Having Never Been Defeated

NO OPPONENT APPEARS

Much Important Litigation Occupies Attention During First Term

George M. Brown, attorney general for Oregon, who has held the office since 1914, filed his candidacy for re-nomination Saturday. So far, no other candidate has appeared to contest with Mr. Brown for the nomination and it is believed he will be without opposition.

When he was a candidate in 1914 Mr. Brown ran as a Republican without any modifications, but his Democratic friends joined with Republicans in urging him to run for attorney general. At the general election he carried every county in the state with a plurality of 64,188 votes. His total vote was 127,889, while his nearest opponent received 63,701.

Handles Important Cases. Much important litigation has had the attention of Attorney General Brown during his present term. Among important cases were the prosecution of the Hyde-Benson land fraud cases, the establishment of the constitutionality of the workmen's compensation act, establishment of the constitutionality of the 10-hour day law tried before the United States supreme court, constitutionality of the water board law, also tried by the United States supreme court, and numerous cases involving the prohibition law.

Mr. Brown was elevated to the position of attorney general after a long career as a law enforcement officer. He had just completed nearly nineteen consecutive years as district attorney, and before his election as district attorney in 1894 he had served three years as a deputy prosecutor. During the first eleven years of his incumbency his district comprised the counties of Lane, Benton, Douglas, Coos, Curry and Lincoln. The district was then divided and his work lay in Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, and when the county attorney system went into effect he became district attorney for Douglas county.

Brown Never Defeated. District attorney and attorney general are the only offices for which Mr. Brown has ever been a candidate, but he has the reputation of having never been defeated.

Though as a state official he lives at Salem, he maintains Roseburg as his residence and votes there on election day. He was born near Roseburg May 5, 1864, his parents, Thomas and Sarah Brown, being pioneers who were engaged in farming. Mr. Brown attended Umpqua academy and Willamette university. He was graduated from Willamette in 1885. For four years he taught school and earned money to study law. He was admitted to the bar in 1891.

After Mr. Brown's name on the ballot at the election this year will appear the words: Present attorney general; asks second term, continuing economical, efficient law enforcement, securing results.

For Complete Americanism. His declaration follows: "I will, during my term of office, pursue my past policy by giving to the state the best service of which I am capable."

"My one aim has ever been to protect the public interest, conscientiously, economically and efficiently. Keeping in mind that 'all power is inherent in the people,' and when they have spoken either directly or through their representatives, it becomes the sworn duty of the attorney general to assume that the laws so made were enacted in good faith, are valid and should be enforced. "I am a Republican, and believe in clean-cut, straight-out, 100 per cent Americanism, now, henceforth and forever."

F. W. MULKEY
GIVES REASON

Hopes to Preserve to Voters Right to Fill Vacancies in Office

That only by an election for the short term can a precedent be established in Oregon that the people shall permanently fill a vacancy in the United States senate after the governor has made an appointment, is the reason given by Fred W. Mulkey for his candidacy for the short term as senator. Mr. Mulkey says that his only object in running is patriotically to preserve for the state the right of the people to fill permanently a senatorial vacancy by their own election and to establish the fact that it is a privilege of the governor to make a temporary appointment only. Mr. Mulkey reiterates his declaration made some time ago that if elected he will resign the day he qualifies in favor of the elected senator for the long term.

Paul M. Long, of Portland, Republican, yesterday filed his candidacy for representative in the legislature from the 18th district. His slogan is "Victory for democracy; encourage new industries; develop
