

WITHYCOMBE AND MOSER DECLARE

Candidacies for Governor Are Formally Filed With Secretary

Governor Withycombe yesterday filed at the office of Secretary of State O'Leary his declaration of candidacy for re-nomination, and Gus C. Moser of Portland, one of the governor's five opponents for the Republican nomination, also filed his declaration.

Governor Withycombe submits no platform with his declaration and his slogan is simply "Present governor; candidate for second term." Senator Moser throws the gauntlet to the paving trust. His slogan is "Patriotic American; for good roads, but fighting the paving trust; economy, efficiency." His platform follows:

"Give the public my conscientious and patriotic service; devote my untiring efforts to bringing the world war to a speedy and victorious conclusion, in order that democracy may live and human liberty survive; practice the most rigid economy and inaugurate strict business principles in state affairs; develop our agri-

K. K. Kubli, Portland, eighteenth representative district. Slogan, "National welfare first; state's needs second; local interests protected; win the war. Platform, 'Give full support to such legislation as will assist in winning the war; advocate and advance legislation for protection of rights of soldiers enlisted from Oregon; will do all in my power to protect and promote shipbuilding and manufacturing; will not overlook development of the state nor the fact that much may be done to aid the soldier returning from the trenches; will assist the government in conservation of expenditures by curtailing taxation where it can be done without hampering the great object which is now the paramount endeavor of all American citizens—the winning of the war.'"

E. P. Dodd, Hermiston; twenty-third representative district. No platform, no slogan.

Charles Albert Small, La Grande; twenty-fifth representative district. Platform, "Stand for a patriotism that puts humanity above dollars; regulation of profiteers in this hour of need; greatest possible encouragement to farm production; relief of Oregon's war sufferers; national prohibition and woman suffrage; fair play to capital and labor alike; daylight politics; a corrupt practice act to eliminate boss control in election of officers and committee placements in the legislature; consolidation of state boards where possible, consistent with efficiency and economy; for the Oregon system always; I am opposed to any and every measure that would tend to make the initiative and referendum less useful as channels of popular rule." No slogan accompanies the declaration.

EDITORIALS OF THE PEOPLE

What Duty Means.

War is this nation's business and each of us have our duties to perform. It may be the Red Cross, knitting for soldiers, or keeping house more economically for the family. The claims our attention. Or perhaps our duty may call upon us to farm a little larger acreage and thereby a little better and thus help to feed the world and particularly our soldiers. Our duty may cause us to shoulder a musket with the home guards, or if we are more fortunate as to age and physical condition, follow the colors to the front line trenches to fight an every true-blooded American loves to fight, and win. So it is that our duties to our nation differ, our sacrifices on behalf of the cause of liberty and justice differ. Some are required to make that supreme sacrifice and give their all, their lives for the cause. No thought of reward, no thought of living in the memory of a nation as a hero among a million heroes, no thought of applause from his fellow man inspires the boys to go over the top, meet the enemy and die fighting, as we firmly believe only an American can fight. Then there are those who lay on the altar of freedom a limb, an arm or an eye or perhaps two. These are losses that those of us who stay at home cannot share with them. Then there are those who return unscathed from the battlefield. Now we come to the class that stay at home. You and I. What is our sacrifice? What is required of us? At this time we are asked to invest all that we conveniently can in liberty bonds being a very important interest, and constituting the safest investment in the world today. A sacrifice indeed. It looks by comparison more like a privilege. If we would give all our worldly goods and start anew, our sacrifice would be trifling compared to the sacrifice of those boys who give their lives that we may enjoy life and liberty, and as the immortal Lincoln has said, "that this government of the people, for the people and by the people shall not perish from the earth."

MODIFICATION COURT'S ORDER

Judgment Against Western Union for Death of Laborer Is Changed

The supreme court yesterday in the case of Jessie McLemore, appellant, vs. the Western Union Telegraph company, an appeal from Multnomah county, in the matter of a petition for rehearing, modified its former opinion by reducing the amount of the judgment allowed the plaintiff against the defendant for the loss of her husband by accidental death while employed by the defendant. Justice McCannan wrote the decision.
