NEW YORK, April 15 .-- A pereptible quickening of trading, mosty at material advances, accompanied today's session of the stock market. The reassuring nature of foreign advices was a potent factor and domestic happenings also served to stimulate the broader demand.

Chairman Gary's reference to the future dividends at the annual meeting of the United States Steel corporation and his statement outlining the corporation's shipbuilding activities gave impetus to steel common. that stock being restored to its wonted leadership at a net advance of two points.

Speculative Shares Gain. The more extreme gains were made, however, by various speculative shares in which large short interests is believed to exist. Distillers added 4 1-4 points to last weeks' steady gain, Industrial Alcohol advanced 2 3-4 and netroleums, Baldwin Locomotive, Crucible Steel and International Paper registered gross gains of two to four points. Rails were backward at the start
