NEW YORK, April 16 .- On a further increase of operations, confined, however, to the recognized leaders, today's stock market added one to two points to yesterday's gains. This advantage was only temporary, however, prices re temporary, prices reacting after short covering had run its course.

SCHWAB TO HEAD SHIP BUILDING

Steel Magnate Becomes Director-General of Fleet Corporation

WASHINGTON, April 16 .- The building of the great merchant marine which will transport, America's men and resources to the battle front was entrusted today by the shipping board to Charles M. Schwab, steelmaker and shipbuilder, who becomes director-general of the emergency fleet corporation with unlimited powers to put through the vast building
