GIRLS RESIST FIVE OFFICERS

Incorrigible Bolt From Industrial School—Now Held in Jail

Margaret and Blanche Kennedy, alias Vivian and Lavonne Reynolds, two incorrigibles at the state industrial school for girls, bolted from that institution Sunday afternoon, and it took five men, including Salem police officers, to arrest them and lodge them in the city jail. The two girls persuaded one other girl to accompany them in the break, but she later returned without resistance. Her name is withheld.

The Kennedy girls were taken into custody here January 5 while tramping from Seattle to San Francisco with a man who was a deserter from the navy. When received at the state school they gave the name of Reynolds.

The girls escaped Sunday from premises of the institution where most of the girls were gathered for the afternoon. When the women employees were unable to bring them back they called the Salem police. The girls cursed madly in resisting the officers, but were finally forced into an automobile and taken to jail where they are now held.

The home of the girls is believed to be in Seattle, where they are said to have a sister and two brothers. Secretary Goodin of the state board of control has written the relatives to make efforts to have them returned to Washington, but the letters are unanswered. One letter was written to Miss Helen Kennedy, an employe of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company in Seattle.

The conduct of the two girls at the industrial school has an important bearing on the recent reports of the improper treatment of girls at the institution. Mrs. Margaret Mann, superintendent of the school, says the bread and water diet has not thus far been given more than two days in succession, and then at only one meal a day, the other meals being the same as that provided the other girls at regular meals.

"These two girls are utterly incorrigible," said Secretary Goodin. "Mrs. Mann does not know what to do with them. We want to get rid of them and we are trying to have them returned to Washington, where they belong."

Federal Forest Examiner Preparing Season's Work

R. H. Chapler, Federal forest examiner who is connected with the Portland office, was in conference with State Forester F. A. Elliott yesterday concerning fire prevention work for the coming summer and fall. Mr. Chapler's work comes under the application of the Week's law fund and the Oregon-California grant land patrol. The work is done by the state under contract with the government and the duty of the examiner is to see that the contracts are complied with.

Under the Week's law the state has available \$8000 annually and employs 50 patrolmen for a period of two months. For the patrol of the Oregon-California grant lands, congress appropriated \$25,000 annually.

Cherrians to Give Show at Vancouver Barracks

The Salem Cherrian minstrels have been invited to give their performance at Vancouver barracks next Tuesday night and have accepted the invitation. The call came from H. W. Stone, secretary of the Portland Y. M. C. A. who is in charge of the Y. M. C. A. hut at Vancouver. It will be necessary for the members of the cast to pay their own expenses to Vancouver, but they have decided to make the trip by automobile and the expense will not be great.
