

Lower Columbia Road Work Is Rushed to Completion
The improvement of the lower Columbia River highway from Clatskanie in Columbia county, to Svenson, in Clatsop county, a stretch of eighteen miles, will be completed by July 1 if the present rate of progress is maintained, it was said at the office of the state highway commission yesterday. The improvement is of macadam type and construction crews are laying an average of a mile each week. The work is being done by the state forces.
