Simteropol Reached by Army of General Kosch

BERLIN, via. London, April 24 .-Troops commanded by General von der Goltz have taken the railway junction at Khyuvinge and Riklimyaki, Finland, and established com-munications with the Finnish army north of Lakhti. In the Crimea, troops under the command of General Kosch have reached Simferopol.

The reported presence of German troops at Simferopol marks the cutting of the railroad connecting the fortress of Sebastopol with the main land of Russia. Simferopol is 25 miles northeast of Sebastopol.
