San Francisco Passes Quota In Loan Subscriptions

y loan subscriptions actually sent to power to create strength. the federal reserve bank from the Twel fth Federal Reserve bank district, it was announced tonight, are well beyond the district's quota of \$210,000,000. Subscriptions not yet reported and others in the mail, it was said, would make a total of more than \$260,000,000.

The goal of those in charge of the campaign in the twelfth district is to establish a record for the nation in the number of subscribers. Campaign Manager George K. Weeks, said tonight that he believed every county in the entire district will exceed its quota. Oregon and Southern California

and Nevada have reported every county beyond the allotment. In Arizona six of the nine counties have exceeded their quotas. In Northern Caliofrnia only two countles were

reported to be behind. The total number of honor flags awarded today in the district was 1182. California has received 517 flags; Oregon 351; Washington 205; Idaho 80, and Alaska seven.
