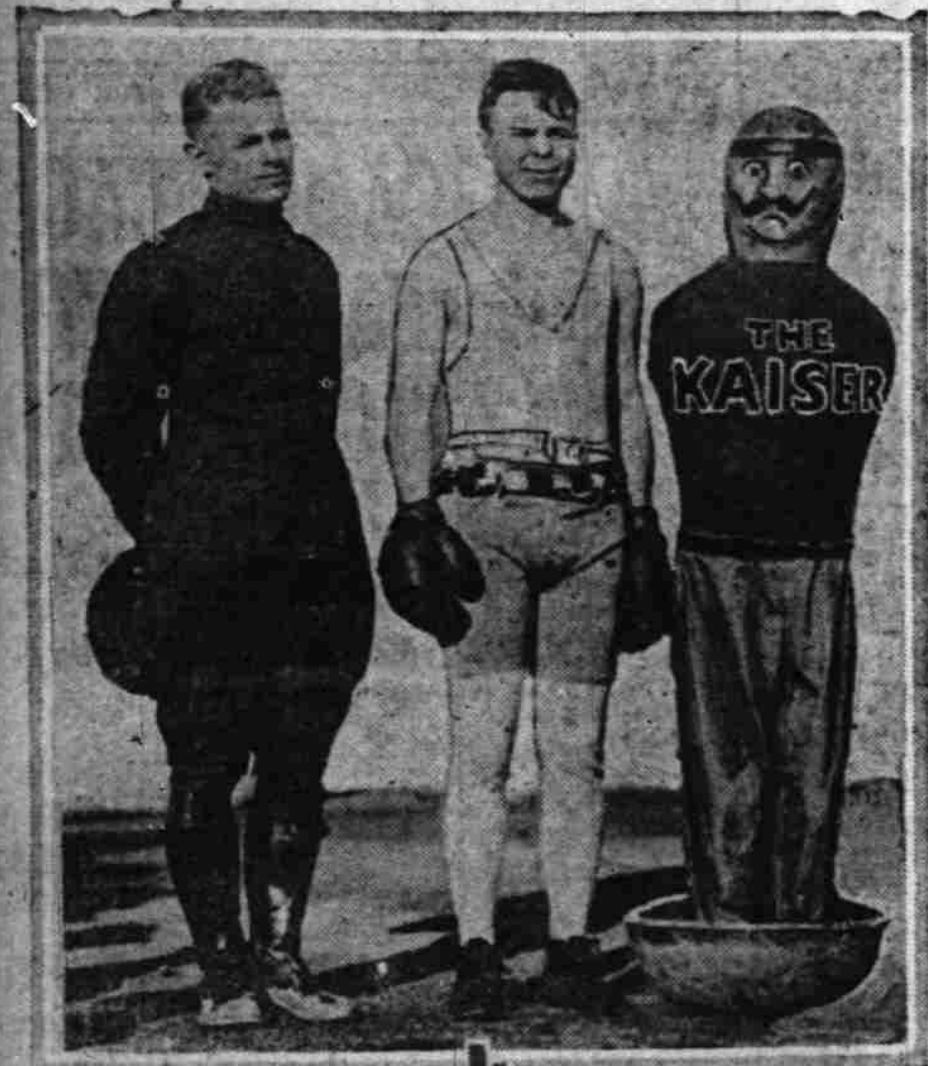


Former Champion and His Kaiser Dummy

WANTS RANKING PLACED HIGHER

Bishop at Camp Lewis Says Chaplains Should Be Captains

CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., May 6.—Army chaplains should have a higher rank than first lieutenant, in the opinion of Bishop William Lawrence of the Episcopal diocese of Eastern Massachusetts, who today addressed a meeting of chaplains, army pastors and Y. M. C. A. secretaries at camp. Bishop Lawrence said better co-operation between chaplains and company officers would result if the chaplains were rated as a captain or a major.

The bishop spoke on the work of the chaplains in the present war and the recognition that has been given them by the government in establishing a school at which chaplains are to be trained before being assigned.

Bishop Lawrence has charge of a fund of his church for carrying on religious work in the camps and came to Camp Lewis to obtain information which would guide him in appropriations and to investigate a proposal to establish an Episcopal church in camp.

"We are getting too far away from the denomination in this war," the bishop told the Y. secretaries. "We are forgetting we are Baptists, Methodists, Episcopalians, and working together in the religious betterment of the soldier. There is danger that this may go too far and after the war a tendency to drift away from the church as an institution might result."

The bishop suggested that denominational religious meetings in camp be held occasionally to keep the men of each church together.

Stopping only a few hours before continuing his tour of all posts and cantonments, Lieutenant Colonel E. G. Davis, judge advocate general's reserve corps, visited Camp Lewis Sunday on an inspection trip.

Soldiers tonight heard first hand of the devastation of Belgium by the Germans when Professor V. Horta and Madame Horta of Belgium lectured at the Liberty theater on the situation in their country.

Enlisted men no longer will have to work in the hot sun with their blouses buttoned tight under the chin. An order today authorized the men to drill, maneuver, appear on the target ranges and do fatigue duty minus the blouse but they must wear it all other times. Guards and military police are to enforce the order. The appearance without the blouse is not permissible, however, unless the practice is uniform in each unit.

The camp athletic council met tonight to arrange for the opening of the two soldier baseball leagues on May 15. Games will be played every Wednesday. Plans for several athletic meets to be held soon also were discussed.

Today was a light day at the receiving station of the casual office, after the influx of draft men during the past week. About forty men, largely those who had been transferred from eastern draft boards, were received as recruits. The men came from as far east as New York and south as Arkansas.

W. G. McMorran, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., will leave camp Thursday to take charge of a recruiting campaign to get new men to act as secretaries in army camps overseas. Seven hundred men a month are wanted and the northwest is asked to supply fifty. Mr. McMorran's headquarters will be in Seattle and he will be assisted by O. E. Tyler of Seattle, secretary of the northwestern district of the national war work council.

Dallas Power Company Manager Is Promoted

DALLAS, May 6.—(Special to The Statesman)—R. U. Steelquist who for the past two years has been local manager of the office of the Oregon Power company and also manager of the Monmouth and Independence offices, leaves Dallas this week to accept a higher office with the same company. Albany, J. L. White, a former Dallas man, who has been in charge of the Albany office for the past several years, has severed his connection with the Oregon Power company and will devote his time to business interests of his own. Mr. and Mrs. Steelquist have made many warm friends while in this city and they will be greatly missed from the social life of the city. Mr. Steelquist is vice president of the Dallas Commercial club and is also a member of the executive board of the Polk County Fair association.

Lew A. Cates Returns.

ALLIES HAVE ONLY ONE CRY, DAVISON SAYS

No Longer Talk of Alsace-Lorraine, of Belgium or of Indemnity After War

TREATIES WORTHLESS

Red Cross Worker Impressed by Outcome of Brest-Litovsk Negotiations

LONDON, May 6.—H. P. Davison, chairman of the Red Cross war council, who is in London after a tour of inspection of Red Cross work in the allied countries of Europe, and who will return to the United States almost immediately to superintend the second Red Cross "drive" to raise another \$100,000,000 in a single week, when asked as to the impressions he had gained from his trip, said to the Associated Press:

"Any attempt to describe the situation in Europe since March 21 is almost futile, if not impossible. Only those who have been in France since the beginning of the present offensive and have seen conditions there for themselves can have any appreciation of the situation there."

Mr. Davison said he had been most impressed by the apparent result of the Brest-Litovsk treaty which, together with the treaty with Rumania, has eliminated from the minds of the allied peoples in Europe any question of a peace by negotiation. He said:

"There no longer is any talk about Alsace-Lorraine or Belgium, or of indemnity. There is just one cry, and that is 'this world will not be safe until the military power of Germany is crushed.' The same conviction is held in Switzerland, Holland and other small neutral countries, for it is now demonstrated as never before that a treaty with Germany is indeed a scrap of paper and there is no security of life or property so long as she possesses military power."

"The day for considering terms of peace will come only when Germany is beaten. The entry of America gives courage to the allies. The appearance and conduct of the American boys has made an excellent impression on every hand. I hear expressions of admiration for their enthusiasm and modest determination. You may rely upon it that no American man or woman familiar with conditions in Europe will withhold their young lives or their treasure as they are conscious that sacrifice without limit in this time is the one way in which the world may be assured of its freedom."

"They know, as you do, that the next two or three months will be the critical months of the war and they are not to be misled by any lull in the offensive or satisfied with any temporary successes. It will be a final, sure and lasting success that will satisfy either you or them."

Dutch Hiss at Queen

LONDON, April 30.—According to the Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Express, Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands was hissed for the first time in her reign, by the people of Amsterdam during a visit she paid to the city April 4. The action was attributed to the growing shortage of food which is irritating the Dutch people to the point of exasperation.

Will Quadruple Factory Output

Secretary Daniels Orders Increase in Number of Navy Airplanes

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Quadrupling of the output of the navy's big airplane factory at Philadelphia has been ordered by Secretary Daniels. It will be accomplished by making the plant an assembling center for navy aircraft and placing contracts for parts with manufacturers.

Eight months from its inauguration, the Philadelphia plant, has reached the maximum output possible with existing facilities. It has been decided therefore, to change the system of operation in order to meet the demands of the navy's augmented air program.

A large proportion of the machines used by the navy are equipped with Liberty motors secured from the army signal corps. It is understood the navy has been given a certain priority in this matter covering the special type adapted to its use. Recently, flights of navy airplanes driven by Liberty motors have been a frequent occurrence between Hampton Roads and Washington.

Verdun the Germans displayed great nervousness, throwing up many flares.

It has been established that the troops in that section came recently from Flanders. Along the lines near Lunerville the American patrols have been active and have penetrated the enemy lines once more. They found that the enemy had not reoccupied raided portion of their positions and that the town of Anserillers, with the exception of one stone house, had been completely demolished by the American artillery fire. Many German digout under the buildings had been made useless. Prisoners captured from an observation post divulged much useful information and said they had just come to the front from Russia.

Artillery in South

ROME, May 6.—The official statement issued by the war office tonight reads:

"In the Arsa valley we repulsed by machine gun and artillery fire an enemy detachment which approached our lines. On the Asiago plateau a British patrol raided enemy trenches and captured prisoners. On the whole front there was moderate artillery activity and some concentrations of fire in the Tonale plateau and along the lower Plateau from Zenson to the sea."

Huns Announce Successes.

BERLIN, via London, May 6.—The statement issued by the war office today reads:

"In the Flanders fighting area was carried out successful operations. A local attack by the enemy south of Loere failed. Early this morning there was a temporary violent artillery duel between Ypres and Baillieu. Throughout the day only the village

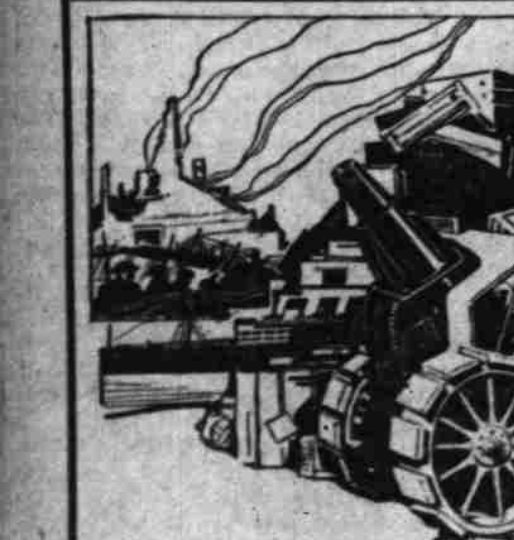
